What then? Shall we give way to despondency? Shall we give up hope and determination because our expectations of victory and a speedy termination of the war have not been realized? Shall we press forward with less energy on the road which we have been compelled to take because it is hedged about with difficulties and dangers and we cap not now see our way through them? God forbid. Such a course would be unmanly in the extreme, even if the condition of our affairs were much worse than it really is. To entertain the thought of giving up the struggle in which we are engaged, before the accomplishment of the object which we have in view, would be to prove false to ourselves-to our brethren who lie slaughtered on many a gory field, to our country, to the interests of civilization and humanity and to those who are to come after us. The face of this war is in His hands. He can terminate it in our favor when ever He pleases, and that too without any miraculous or even extraordinary interposition A single victory on our part, discord among our enemies, foreign aid, or any one of a multitude of causes may be brought into operation and change the whole aspect of affairs.
