TO THE SOLDIERS OF THE CONFEDERATE STATES.

After more than two years of a warfare scarcely equalled in the number, magnitude, and fearful carnage of its battles, a warfare in which your courage and fortitude have illustrated your country and attracted not only gratitude at home, but admiration abroad,

You know too well, my countrymen, what they mean by success. Their malignant rage aims at nothing less than the extermination of yourselves, your wives and children.

Fellow citizens, no alternative is left you but victory, or subjugation, slavery and the utter ruin of yourselves, your families and your country.

I call on you, then, my countrymen, to hasten to your camps, in obedience to the dictates of honor and of duty, and summon those who have absented themselves without leave, who have remained absent beyond the period allowed by their furloughs, to repair without delay to their respective commands, and I do hereby declare that I grant a general pardon and amnesty to all officers and men within the Confederacy, now absent without leave who shall, with the least possible delay, return to their proper posts of duty, but no excuse will be received for any delay beyond 20 days after the first publication of this proclamation.

Finally, I conjure my countrywomen—the wives, mothers, sisters and daughters of the Confederacy—to use their all-powerful influence in aid of this call, to add no crowning sacrifice to those which their patriotism has so freely and so constantly afforded to their country's altar, and to take care that none who owe service in the field shall be sheltered at home from the disgrace of having deserted their duty to their families, to their country, and to their God.

YANKEE VANDALISM IN MISSISSIPPI.

The following which we extract from the Army correspondent of the Atlanta Appeal, is sufficient to invite any one to a determination to spill his last drop of blood, rather than allow the hated race to become the possessors of the city of his home:

Jackson has a deplorable appearance. The block or square in which the Appeal office used to be situated, and the one south of it on the other side of Capital and Fronting on State and Pasca-goula streets, comprising, since the last conflagration, the main business houses in the city, are in ashes. These two blocks include the Episcopal Church, (a neat and comfortable edifice), and the buildings from there to Concert Hall, on State street, the post office, Julian's book store, sweeping round to Spangler Row, and down to Mrs. McMaster's, including the Post Surgeon's office, Medical Director's office, and office of Command-er of the Post. On the opposite side of the street the fiery destruction began with McMurry's heavy stable, consuming the whole mass of buildings, Grill-Straus' store, and thence to Angello's saloon, Grill-Straus' Banking house, and thence to Leany's store, thence down Pasca-goula street, eating out the entire block.

Another correspondent says: Dr. Bailey arrived here yesterday from Jackson. The half has not been told touching the vandalism of the enemy while in occupation of that ill-fated city. Every house in the place that was unoccupied, and nearly all of those whose owners remained to protect them, was sacked and gutted. Officers as high as Colonels were seen to enter and steal articles of value and vertu, and carry them away. Some of these officers were heard to say:—Well, I have never stolen anything before, but I will take this 'Malogany and rosewood bedsteads, with mattresses, mus- quito bars, and all the appurtenances of a com- modore, and all the bedsteads set up and the whole standing as if in a bed chamber, together with rosewood marble-slatted dining tables, chairs, sofas, fire tables, pianos, ottomans, mirrors, and all the costly furniture of the citizens, were scattered all along the entrenchments from the southwest bend of the Pearl river to the extreme northern line of the works.

On these beds the Yankees slept, and carried on their hellish debaucheries with the negro wenches of the town; played cards and gambled, ate and drank on the tables, and amused themselves among this stolen plunder during their drunken carousals, in their own refined and elegant way, and at their departures broke them into a thousand pieces. One General, said to be a General Logan, carried off two fine parlor chairs from Mr. Holm's residence, telling Mr. Holm that he would return them, but he failed to perform his promise. The fine State Library, at the Capitol building, they hauled off in wagons, took what books they desired and destroyed the rest. This library was one of the most select in not only a loss to Mississipp, but to mankind, and cannot be replaced. In Mr. Holson's residence they cut his family portraits, mutilated everything they could not carry off, cut large square pieces from the centre of his carpets, and wrote vulgar and obscene sentences upon the walls. But these things seem to have been their peculiar mission in every house; for, in addition to the pilage, destruction and mutilation of private property, the slime of their wretchedly low and libidinous language can be traced on every wall, the witness at once of their vulgarity, barbarism and crime; the blinding and deforming, but still farther and squalid evidence that they are Yankees.
