## AN ARMY INCIDENT.

[NO. 1264.]

Many stirring incidents take place along the lines of this army which are suffered to pass away from memory for want of a chronicler. This ought not to be, as the future historian may derive from them important assistance in forming 18 00 an accurate idea of this great contest, and the 30 00 matchless courage of the men of the South.

I heard yesterday an incident which deserves to be put on record. When General Stuart commenced his march to Pennsylvania, by way of Manassas, about the 24th of June, he had a fight Applications for pupils may be addressed to me at with a body of the enemy's cavalry at Glasscock's Gap, in the Bull Run Mountain, near Thoroughare, and drove them off. About twenty prisoners were taken, and as the road was thought to be clear they were ordered to be taken to the rear, the direction of Culpeper C. H. Lt. Saussy, of the Jeff. Davis Legion, was put in charge of them, with a detail of four men to serve as a guard The Lieutenant proceeded with his orisoners by Little Baltimore in the direction of Warrenton, supposing that the way was entirely clear; but after proceeding some distance was met by a scouting party who informed him that they had just run against a regiment of Yankee cavalupon his qualifications as an efficient instructor and captured. Having given him this information

they proceeded on their way.
Instead of turning back, Lieut. Saussy determined to see for himself, and not change his route unless compelled to do so. He marched his prisoners to the woods, by the side of the road, and ordering them to lie down on their faces in a dry ditch, put two of his men in charge, directing them to run their sabres through the first man who turned over even. With the two other men, he then went in the direction of the enemy and dismounting, proceeded on foot and came on their column drawn up in the road. Creeping through the undergrowth until he and his two men were close on the yankees, he suddenly opened fire on them with a loud shout to an imiginary squadron to "Charge the Rascals!"

The effect was instantaneous. The enemy were thrown into entire disorder, and scatterd in every direction, leaving the Lieutenant in ossession of the field. He then marched his prisoners to Warrenton, crossed the Rappahannock, and delivered them to the Provost Marshal at Culpeper C. H. As he was leaving them, a Captain of the party

said, with concentrated venom: "I hope we will
