was protected from the Federal sharpshooters by his reserve line in the outer defences He then sent in a flag of truce to the commander of the garrison, demanding the unconditional surrender of the fort and garri-or, with all the stores and munitions, stating the advantage of his position, his determination to carry the fort, and announcing that if his demand was not complied with, he did not feel certain that he would

The assault was commenced, and in five minutes after the bugle sounded the charge the fort was in possession of our men. Our advanced skirmishers went over the works pell-mell, all around them, each man lifting his fellow by the leg, and mounting on the shoulder of their comrades until the fort was filled with Confederates. Col Booth, commanding the garrison, was the first man killed, and not an officer of the negro regiment was left alive. It is true that a few. black and white, threw down their arms and made signs of surrender-but at the same time the men on each side of them still retained their arms and kept up a constant fire and show of resistance.
