PRIVATE LETTER FROM GEN. LEE. The original of the following private letter rom Gen. Lee to his son was found at Arlington House, and is interesting as illustrating a phase in his character:

ARLINGTON HOUSE, April 5, 1852. My Dear Son: I am just in the act of leaving nome for New Mexico. My fine old regiment has been ordered to that distant region, and I must hasten to see that they are properly taken care of. I have but little to add in reply to your letters of March 26, 27 and 28. Your letters breathe a true spirit of frankness; they have given myself and your mother great pleasure. You must study to be frank with the world; frankness is the child of honesty and courage. Say what you mean to do on every occasion, and take it for granted you mean to do right. If a friend sake favor, you should grant it, if it is reasonable; if not, tell him plainly why on the will wrong him and wrong yourself by courself will wrong him and wrong yourself by course you to do so, is dearly purchased at a sterifice. Deal kindly, but firmly, with all your class-mates; you will find it the policy which wears best. Above all, do not appear to others what you are not. If you have any fault to find with any one, breathe a true spirit or frankness; they have givnot. If you have any fault to find with any one, tell him, not others, of what you complain; there is no more dangerous experiment than that of undertaking to be one thing before a man's face and another behind his back. We should live, act, and say nothing to the injury of any one. It is not only best as a matter of principle, but it is the path to peace and honor.

In regard to duty, let me, in conclusion of this hasty letter, inform you that nearly a hundred years ago there was a day of remarkable gloom and darkness—still known as the dark day—a day when the light of the sun was slowly extinguished, as if by an eclipse. The Legislature of Jonnecticut was in session, and as its members saw the unexpected and unaccountable darkness coming on, they shared in the general awe and terror. It was supposed by many that the last day—the day of judgment—had come. Some one, in the consternation of the hour, moved an adjournment. Then there arose an old Puritan legislator, Devenport, of Stamford, who said that if the lest day had come, he desired to be found at his place doing his duty, and, therefore, moved that candles be brought in so that the House could proceed with its duty. There was quietness in that man's mind—the quietness of hearenly wisdom—an inflexible willing=cos to obey present duty. Duty, then, is the subliment word in our language. Do your duty in all things like the old Paritan. You cannot do more; you should never wish to do less. Never let me and your mother wear one gray hair for any lack of

duty on your part.

An Example for Military Men .- In 1808, the Dolandin Wind in musu expedition destined to oprate in the Peninsula. He had made all his removal of soldiers' families out of such houses as they preparations with the foresight and thoroughness actually sailed, when the Ministry determined to supersede him in the command. In a very laconic note, assigning no reasons for the change. Though deeply mortified, no doubt, he sacrificed all personal considerations to patriotism and principle, and in a letter, written soon after, said: "I shall do my best to ensure the success of the army; and you may depend on it, that I shall not hurry the operations, or commence them one moment sooner than they cught to be commenced, in order that I may acquire the credit of the success. The Government will determine for me in what way they will employ me hereafter, either here or elsewhere." When asked by a familiar friend 8. Some Physicians of the highest standing prescrib how he, who had commanded armies of forty thousand men, who had received the thanks of Parliament for his victories, and been elected Knight of the Bath, could submit to be reduced to the command of a brigade of infantry? "For this reason," was the reply, "I am nimukwallah, as we say in the East; I have ate of the King's salt, and therefore I consider it to be my duty to serve with zeal and promptitude when or wherever the King or his Government may think proper to employ me."

A great military principle is here enforced by a great military man, not only by precept but example. Officers who decline to serve their country in a capacity which they consider inferior to their merits may study with advantage this page in the history of Wellington. Devoctating the South —Speaking of Georgia, the New York Times, Liacoln's especial metropo-

litan organ, thus most complacently observes: When General Sherman finishes with her, she will be but a monument of deselation." Desolation has come to be the sole policy of our enemies in this war. They cannot win us back by seducing and corrupting the people, nor conquer us back by overthrowing our armies: but at least they can, from time to time, lay waste a tract of fertile country on their march, and gratify their feelings by the sight of old woman driven houseless into the forests, and by listening to the wail of children orying for oread. They cannot destroy the Confederate armies; but they can torture the souls of thousands of soldiers by the thought that the wives and little ones they left at home may be at some given moment subjected to the outrages of avmed ruffians; may be wandering shoeless in the cruel winter weather, after seeing the roof that sheltered them and their whole provision for the season burnt to ashes. Yes, so much, at least, that mighty military nation, with its enormous armies and all the resources of science to aid, has been able—to its great honor and glory
—partially to accomplish And the nation highly appreciates and keenly relishes this success, for want of better. Northern readers gloat over the description of a "broad tract of desolation" left in Sherman's line of march; and Sheridan has become the hero and darling of his people ever since he sent them the accurate list of barns, mills and dwellings burnt to the ground in the
