> The Great New Year's Dinner to Gen. Lee's Army-Its Distribution To-Day-The Proramine, de. - "Coming events cast their shadows ocfore." The "event" now foreshadowed as about to take place is the great dinner to Gen. Lee's army of Northern Virginia, donated by the people of Virginia, cooked and prepared at the Ballard House, and to be served along the line of the army to day under the superintendence of committees of citizens appointed for that purpose. The stupendous work of cooking and preparing the meats and fowls for the dinner was concluded last night by Mr. Thompson Tyler, the king of caterers, and its successful and satisfactory accomplishment, in the face of so many difficulties, has justly designated him as the only man whom history will record as having cooked a dinner for

meats in barrals and boxes was commenced under the direction of a gentleman selected from the committee. Care was taken that an assortment if all the meats and other viands provided were packed in each box, so that the bill of fare should be uniform all along the immense table, stretching its two wings upon the north and south side of the James. This assortment embeaces beef, ham, mutton, venison, snoat, fowl, sausage, sto. The barrels packed average about 126 pounds net weight. The boxes average about 230 pounds. The record of the weight of every carrel and box is kept in a book, and the same marked on the barrel or box. One of the barrels, we noticed, bore the direction—"General R. E.
