WASHINGTON, April 19. Delano is absent from the Cabinet. The Geneva Conference was discussed.

Details untranspired. The President sent a message to the House to-day, giving full details of his information regarding ku-klux in several South Carolina counties. His information was mostly oral, except that derived from Akerman's report, which asserted, among other things, that these combinations embrace two-thirds of the active white men and have sympathy and countenance of a majority of the other third. They are connected with similar combinations in other counties

Terrible Tornado in South Carolina-New Market House at Columbia Blown Down-Damage at

CHARLESTON, April 19.

A terrible tornado swept over the up country Thursday night. The new market house at Columbia, which was about finished, was blown down. But the worst damage done was in Chester, at which place 62 houses were entirely destroyed by the storm and many others seriously damaged. Nobody but four colored persons were injured by the falling houses. Miles of fencing were blown down, and thousands of large fruit trees torn up by the roots. The total loss in Chester is \$50,000, and mostly falling on persons of small means. A meeting was held in Chester to-day to take steps for the relief of the sufferers. The tornado moved westwardly, and was of short duration.
