DECEMBER 10, 1872 ORPHAN ASTEUM FOR

During the session of the Grand Longe of Masons in this city last week, a resolution was adopted donating the magnificient building of St. John's Col lege at Oxford, as an Asylum to the indigent orphan children of the State and making an annual appropriation for its support.

Our readers will remember that the News published several articles on this subject last Spring, in which we took the position that St. John's College should be converted into an Orphan Asylum, and urged that a movement be inaugurated in the State, looking to its purchase and use for that purpose.

St. John's College was erected several years before the war at a cost of some thirty thousand dollars. It was origi nally designed for a Masonic College but the plan has not proved a feasible one, or at least has never been carried out, from various causes-a reference to which would now be useless. Since itcompletion, the building has been leased out occasionally for educational purposes-but at intervals has remained in an unoccupied and useless condition. The purposes of its original erection have signally failed, and the Grand Lodge for a number of years has been puzzled as to what disposition should be made of it.

We seconded the suggestion of the Biblical Recorder for its conversion into an Asylum for the maintenance and education of the poor orphan children of the State, large numbers of whom are rapidly growing up in vice, idleness, ignorance and want-without any supporting or directing hand to save them from lives of wickedness, suffering and shame.

We appealed to the philanthropic and generous citizens of the State to take some measures looking to the melioration of this unfortunate portion of our population, and argued the propriety and practicability of the plan to buy St. John's College of the Masonsknowing its peculiar fitness, in most every respect, for the purposes of an

orphan asylum. Now that the Masons have come forward and with that humanity and gen erosity for which their order has ever been distinguished, dedicated this noble edifice as a free gift to the destitute orphans of the State, and in addition agreed to contribute five hundred dol lars annually to the same object, we desire to add an humble tribute of praise and gratitude in behalf of those base lips are speechless, for whose enefit this great benefaction was conferred, and also in the name of the people of North Carolina whose hearts must be deeply touched by this act of benevo lence and moral sublimity on the part

of the Masonic order. Mr. J. H. Mills, editor of the Biblica Recorder of this city, was elected by the Grand Lodge Superintendent of the Orphan Asylum, with authority to soli cit contributions for its support from all classes of our citizens.

We trust that the press of the State both secular and religious, will lend its voice and its whole influence in aid of the work which has been placed under Mr. Mills' direction, and that a generous response will be made in behalf of this truly charitable and humane undertak-

Thousands of poor children in this State made orphans by the war, whose fathers perished on the field of carnage or died in hospitals from wounds or sickness incurred in behalf of North Carolina, are to-day wandering half-fed, half-clothed, uncared for, uninstructed, Munnitied-with a future before them-Oh! so dark and dreary and hopeless! and as yet no systematic effort has been made either by the State authorities or by the voluntary action of our people to rescue these living objects of our bounty from the dangers, temptations and evils which environ their present pitiable condition.

The plans and purposes of the Superintendent appointed by the Grand Lodge have not yet been made public.

In the meantime, we ask our exchanges to give their encouragement to the project, and to commend to their readers a patriotic and holy cause, which appeals powerfully to the noblest instincts and purest sentiments or the ,sabo I human heart.

COMMENTING ON THE SENA-TORSHIP.

Our State exchanges continue to comment on the circumstances of the election of Judge Merrimon. The general sentiment is one of disappointment and regret that the nominee of the party was not elected. It is not to Judge Merrimon, personally or politically, that any objection has been made-for the opinion seems to be unanimous that if he had been regularly elected by the Conservatives he would have made a Senator of whom the State would have cause to be proud.

But that he should be elected by the unanimous Radical vote with the aid of a tew Conservatives, who were unwilling to support the regular nominee of the party, has produced much dissatisfaction and discontent, and while the public have faith in Judge Merrimon's Con serva-ive principles, they are fearful his conduct is fraught with peril to party rganization.

In order that our readers | may know the popular sentiment as reflected through the mirror of the public press, we propose to give such extracts tomorrow as we may deem judicious, from our State exchanges, on the subject of the Senatorial election.

THE OFFICE OF ASSESSOR ABOLISHED.

We noticed that the lower House of Congress passed on Friday last a bill to abolish the office of Assessor and Assistant Assessor of Internal Revenue. As it is known that the duties of these fficials can be readily performed by the Collectors and their Assistants, the public will be glad to learn that the Assessors will now be made to retire to private life.

This is a move in the right direction. and we trust that Congress will contin ue to apply the knife until all the su perfluous branches, which have been draining the Treasury of the hardearnings of the tax-payers, will be

speedily pruned off. We are in favor of the abolition of the whole Revenue system as at present manipulated, but if we can not get at the root of the evil, we are thankful for any improvement whereby the abuses of the system may be mitigated.

Fears are expressed, however, that the Senate will not concur in the action of the House, and it is therefore by no means certain that the bill will become

We have but little faith in the Senate | Horse Shoes, of the United States. That body has shown itself much more intolerant and proscriptive than the House. But surely matter of so much practical imporance as the abolition of the useless offices of Revenue Assessore and Assistants will meet with the approbation of both Houses of Congress-for the people of both parties demand a curtailment of the extraordinary and unnecessary expenses of collecting the taxes-which have proved so burdensome under the present Internal Revenue system.

APPROPRIATION INSUFFI CIENT.

Before Congress adjourned last Sum mer, Hon. Sion H. Rogers managed by extraordinary efforts to get an appro priation of \$100,000 from the Government, for the erection of Post Office and Circuit Court build ing in this City, on the grounds owned by the Government.

The architect employed to investigate the cost to be incurred in erecting the building, has reported that \$100,000 is [ ] not enough, but that it will require \$250,000 to build the structure designed.

We do not know by what authority the architect acted, but it strikes us that a building costing \$100,000 will be amply sufficient for a Court Room and Post Office.

Considering the unsightly appearance of the shanty now denominated the Raleigh Post Office, and the difficulty Col. Rogers had in getting an appropriation through Congress, we think it will be better to let well enough alone and go to work on the hundred thousand dollar building.
