SATURDAY ... WHY CALDWELL'S ELECTION WAS NOT CONTESTED.

The Radicals seem disposed to make much ado over the fact that the election of Gov. Caldwell and his colleagues on the State ticket, was not contested after all the threats and urgent demands by the Conservative press on the subject.

The official majority of Gov. Caldwell is not quite two thousand. The whole Radical vote of the State was over ninety-eight thousand, while the Conservative vote was over ninety sixthousand.

Immediately after the result was known, charges of fraud, in many instances well substantiated, began to pour in from different sections of the State, and it was soon apparent to those who took an interest in the matter, that Caldwell's majority was obtained by illegal voting and intimidation. In several Western Counties, by means of that political machine, the Revenue department, a number of Conservatives, who could not be induced to vote the Radical ticket, were kept from the polls by threats of prosecution in the Courts, while others were likewise silenced by threats of arrest and punishment under the Ku Klux Act of Congress. Deputy United States Marshals and other Federal officials prostituted their positions in the interest of the Radical party, and by bribes, intimidations and threats, succeeded, to some extent, in their wicked and nefarious political schemes They undoubtedly did much injury to the Conservative cause in certain sections of Western Carolina.

In the Eastern and Central portions of the State, vast numbers of negroes were imported from Virginia and South Carolina, and even a cargo of these imported voters has been traced to Wash-

In view of these facts, the Conservaof the people of the State, and of the purity of the ballot box, demand an investigation of the charges of illegality and fraud, and did demand farther, if it could be proved Judge Merri mon was the legally elected Governor, that he be seated in the position to which he was chosen by the voice of the people.

We deprecated any fruitless, senseless controversy. We asked for the proofs of the frauds, and demanded, if enough be furnished to elect Merrimon, that he be installed in office.

We asked for positive, legitimate, irrefragable evidence; and we contended that unless the charges of fraud be sustained by such evidence, a contest would be useless and should be aban-

The Executive Committee had ample proof of positive and direct fraud and illegality from several sections, but the number of these cases was not sufficient to overcome Caldwell's majority. Of technicalities and irregularities, the cases reached several thousand, and in hand, it would not be proper to engage in a doubtful and bitter contest.
