

PINCHBACK TRANSCENDING HIS DUTY.

Monday was a day of great excitement and trial in New Orleans. A collision between the two opposing State Governments was at one time imminent, but happily no disturbances occurred, and comparative quiet has been temporarily restored.

The trouble grew out of the order of Pinchback, issued on Saturday last, which threatened to disperse the Conservative or Fusion Legislature, in case it should have the temerity to assemble.

General Emory, the commander of the Federal troops at New Orleans, received instructions from President Grant, soon after Pinchback's proclamation appeared, that he must not allow any interference with the Conservative Legislature; "that the United States troops must be used only to preserve the peace; that any body of citizens, styling themselves what they may, have the right to meet peaceably, for any purpose not unlawful; and that if any attempt should be made to disperse any such assembly, they shall be protected."

It is evident Pinchback was laboring under the impression that any high-handed measures he might adopt would meet with the sanction of Grant; and he imagined, if he could disperse the Conservative Legislature, while the question was pending in the Courts as to which of the Legislatures was the lawful one, the case would be at end, and the Radicals would be at once established in power.

But the President could not go that far. His original order sustaining Pinchback, was only provisional or temporary, and was not intended as finally deciding in favor of the Radical State officers. The question as to which set of State officers was legally elected, is still before the Courts, and until that question is decided, the President will not sustain Pinchback in his efforts to disperse the Conservative Legislature; for that Legislature may, in the end, prove to be the rightful and only legal body.

If Pinchback attempts by force to prevent the Conservative Legislature from holding its meetings, the Federal military power, which he invoked to his aid, will, by the order of President Grant, be turned against him, and he will thus be hoisted by his own petard.

A NEW PAPER IN RALEIGH. Hon. Daniel R. Goodloe, of Warrenton, has issued a prospectus of The Commonwealth, a weekly newspaper, which he proposes to publish in Raleigh—the first number to appear some time in March.

In his prospectus, Mr. Goodloe says that The Commonwealth "will be independent of parties, but will be neutral on no question of public concern. It will never fail to vindicate the rights of the individual, the rights of the States, and the perpetuity of the Union."

Mr. Goodloe has had much experience in journalism, and has been connected with the public press, at different intervals, for many years. He conducted a weekly paper in Washington City before the war with much ability, and since the war he established a paper in this city called the Register, which, during the short period of its existence, was a dignified and many exponent of the political doctrines of the school of politics to which Mr. Goodloe belongs.

The Commonwealth will occupy in North Carolina about the same field of politics that the New York Tribune does in the nation. With Republican proclivities and tendencies, it will oppose Radicalism and "the centralizing policy of the Federal Administration, but will be no carping fault-finder, and will cordially welcome and applaud every wise and legitimate measure that emanates from Washington." It will pursue the same course towards the State Administration, and would be more pleased to approve than condemn its measures.

STOKES SENTENCED. Edward Stokes, who was convicted in New York on the 4th inst., of the murder of James Fisk, Jr., has been sentenced by Judge Boardman, to be hanged on Friday, the 28th of February. This, as the telegram informed us, was the shortest time that could be legally allowed the murderer.

The Judge is represented as having delivered a feeling address on the occasion of sentencing the accused, in the course of which "he alluded to the prisoner's youth and social surroundings."

The conviction of Stokes will excite general surprise, as the failure of the jury to agree on the first trial created the impression on the public mind that a second trial would result in his acquittal.

the alarming increase of crime in that city. In this community, the verdict of the jury in convicting Stokes seems to be universally approved, as no one seems to entertain the slightest doubt of his guilt. The only sympathy felt for him was due to the fact that the individual whose life he took, was a man of bad character and exerted an immoral influence on society.

THE USURY LAW IN VIRGINIA. A bill has been introduced in the Virginia Legislature to reduce the legal rate of interest in that State to six per cent. Against this measure many of the leading papers of the State are entering their protest, and are urging the Legislature to permit the law to stand as at present—allowing twelve per cent on special contracts.

We trust that the North Carolina Legislature, when it assembles, will adopt the Virginia rate of twelve per cent, on special contracts—allowing the legal rate to remain as at present—six per cent, where no special agreement is made.

We copy elsewhere to-day an article from the Norfolk Journal, in regard to the proposed change in the Virginia usury law, from which it will be seen that paper takes strong ground against the proposed reduction. It quotes an extract from the News, showing the low rate of interest has driven thousands of dollars of North Carolina capital to Virginia for investment, and the Journal might have even gone farther, and stated that the city of Norfolk itself had received on deposit for investment a large portion of this capital, and that her bankers and merchants were reaping much of the profit and benefit derived from such investment.

It is evident from the tone of the press of this State, we think the people are anxious that the rate on special contracts for money be increased, while the legal rate remain as at present, where there is no agreement as to price.

MRS. WHARTON ON TRIAL AGAIN. Mrs. Wharton is to go through another ordeal. Accompanied by her daughter Nellie, she has again put in an appearance at Annapolis—there to endure the pangs of a new trial for felony, on the charge of attempting to poison Vanness, in Baltimore.

We have no information through the papers whether or not the trial will be a protracted one, but there seemed to be an impression that this second arraignment was more a matter of form than an actual prosecution, and that the prisoner would be speedily discharged, after her triumphant acquittal of the murder of Gen. Ketchum.

If the trial is to be a lengthy one, we shall have the same old scenes re-enacted—the same witnesses, the same testimony, the same disagreement among the learned doctors about poisonous substances and chemical tests, the same arguments of counsel and pathetic appeals, and the same verdict of not guilty.

Surely, if Mrs. Wharton is an innocent woman, she has been greatly wronged and is one of the most unfortunate beings that ever lived. If she is guilty, she deserves no pity and her sufferings are merited.

The Legal Rate of Interest in the State. The decision of this question by the Legislature will have an immediate material effect one way or the other, either for good or evil in Virginia. Money lenders and money borrowers are awaiting it with equal anxiety.

Capitalists are concerned about it, workmen, merchants, mechanics, farmers, in fact all who are engaged in any business in any way in the State, are regarding the Legislature, in reference to its action in this matter, with impatient anxiety. The financial condition of this Commonwealth, and of the people individually, is such that they cannot afford to encounter the inevitable effects that would ensue from a return to six per cent, as the maximum rate of interest allowed by the law. We want money to be flowing into the State, instead of out of it. The way to attract money is to offer a fair per centage for it, certainly not to make it unlawful to pay as much for the use of it as the lender and borrower may both be able to agree upon and may both be able to afford.

The Raleigh Daily News of Thursday, discussing the question of usury in its application to North Carolina, says: "Hundreds of thousands of dollars of North Carolina capital flow annually to Virginia for investment on account of the low rate of interest in this State. This is lost to us—or if it comes back, it is because our people are compelled to go to Virginia for it, and borrow it at Virginia rates."

There is an argument in this brief paragraph which our Legislature would do well to consider.
