ORGANIZATION OF THE N. C. LIFE INSURANCE COMPANY.

The meeting of the Corporation of the North Carolina State Life Insurance Company was held at the Citizens' National Bank on yesterday.

Messrs. K. P. Battle, W. J. Hawkins, J. M. Heck, A. G. Lee, John G. Williams, W. G. Upchurch, W. E. Anderson, W. A. Smith, Graham T. R. Caldwell, E. Andrew, J. C. Blake, R. H. Battle, W. C. Stronach, W. R. Cox, Wm. Grimes and P. A. Wiley were present.

On motion, K. P. Battle was appointed Chairman, and John C. Blake, Secretary.

On motion, Mr. Graham was requested to read the charter. Upon the charter being read it was accepted.

On motion, the capital stock was limited, for the present, to \$100,000.

On motion of John G. Williams, W. E. Anderson and John C. Blake were appointed a Committee to open books of subscription immediately at the three National Banks in this city, and as soon as the \$100,000 is subscribed, they shall call a meeting of the subscribers within ten days thereafter in the city of Raleigh.

On motion, the meeting adjourned.

At 12:30 the Court adjourned to meet again this morning at 10 o'clock.

SUPERIOR COURT.—Yesterday morning the Court opened at 10 o'clock, and the following is a brief synopsis of the proceedings:

State vs Wilson Bridgers was called up, charged with murder, and the defendant was arraigned and remanded to jail.

State vs Geo. W. Swenson came up, and the defendant was called and arraigned; judgement nisi.

State vs Peter Badger, affray, was taken up and a nol prosequi ordered.

State vs Badger Harrison, charged with injury to stock, was tried, and the jury returned a verdict of not guilty.

Mr. H. E. Cullom, of Johnston, appointed, exhibited his license from the Supreme Court, and was admitted to practice as an attorney of the Court.

The Court adjourned while the trial of the case of the State vs Sheppard et al, was progressing, to meet this morning at 10 o'clock.

To-day, the case of Simpson Mordcaid and the other negroes who robbed and beat Mr. Hicks some time ago, comes up.

SPLIT OUT.—The only excitement on Fayetteville street yesterday was the "splitting out" of a one mule wagon, Jas. H. Moore, Esq., the Steward of the Lunenburg Asylum, which broke down in front of the office of the Southern Express Company. Mr. Moore was coming out town to lay in some necessary supplies for the Asylum, and in the wagon was a two gallon jug to contain his portion of said supplies. In the break down, Mr. Moore was thrown in such a way as to cause him to perform that most difficult feat for a man of his age—the double somersault. We witnessed the feat, and must say it was well done, reflecting much credit upon the capacity of Mr. Moore, considering this was his first appearance before the public.

The jug aforesaid came tumbling after Mr. Moore and striking him on the back of his head, caused a severe denture in the jug, which was the only casualty we could report; and the wagon being taken to the shop and speedily repaired.

NOON DISPATCHES.

Aid for the Cuban Revolutionists.—A Bloody Affair, &c.

New York, Jan. 8.—An Aspinwall letter states that the steamer "Edgar Stewart" which had received a new crew from New York, and was announced as having sailed from Cartagena, has really sailed for Cuba, with her large cargo of arms and ammunition to the revolutionists. She is under the command of Gen. M. Agüero who heretofore has been quite successful in similar expeditions. Of some sixty of the crew, forty-one are recruits for the Cuban army.

At a free fight among quymen in a drinking house in Centerville, a hamlet near Saugerties, New Year's night, a Miss Hill had the top of her head beaten in, and Mrs. Stewart had several ribs broken and was fatally injured. Another woman was also brutally beaten, and some twenty men combatants were all more or less injured. The fight was one of unusual savageness. No arrests.

The Wharton Trial—A Motion to Quash the Indictment Denied. ANNAPOLIS, Md., Jan. 8.—The session of the Court to-day was commenced in arguing a motion to quash the indictment against Mrs. Wharton, which the Court denied.

Small Pox in Bangor. BANGOR, ME., Jan. 8.—The Courts have adjourned on account of the small pox.

MIDNIGHT DISPATCHES. Missouri Senatorial Question. ST. LOUIS, Jan. 8.—A meeting of Democratic Senators and Representatives was held in Jefferson city last night. Senatorial aspirants, having been invited to address the meeting, Col. L. V. Begg, Ex Gov. Reynolds, Col. Geo. C. West, Judge Upton and General Edwards, made speeches, expressing their views on national affairs. Neither Senator Blair nor Gen. Phelps were present, both being too sick to attend.

Appropriation for the Investigation into Louisiana and Arkansas Election Matters. WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—SENATE.—Twenty thousand dollars have been appropriated for the expenses of the Committee on Election and Privileges in investigating Louisiana and Arkansas elections. The discussion on Indian appropriations was resumed.
