Mr. Merrimon opposed the bill from the fact he did not believe the commissioners, proposed to be appointed, could possibly perform the duties assigned by them in the time prescribed in the bill. He favored the section of the bill incorporating in our public schools an agricultural feature, but

otherwise thought the bill defective, Mr. Worth was glad to come to the support of the Senator from Orange in the passage of this bill. The bill proposes as one of the proposed Commissioners. Mr. Sampson, of Guillord, who has done more good towards the development of agriculture than every Agricultural or Geological Society ever organized in the State. He thought the passage of the bill conducive to the general good of

the people, and he would support it. Mr. Merrimon offered an amendment providing that the salaries of the proposed Commissioners be paid out of the fund appropriated to the Geological

Mr. Morehead, of Rockingham, was in favor of the original bill, but would not support it if Mr. Merrimon's amendment was adopted.
