THE SCHOOL BILL.—We shall publish from time to time, the most important changes made in the school law by the recent enactment. The following act which is now a law will prove of much interest to many of our readers:

AN ACT FOR THE RELIEF OF CERTAIN SCHOOL TEACHERS. SEC. 1. The General Assembly of North Carolina, do enact, that the County Treasurers be authorized and directed to pay out of the schools funds in their hands, such sums of money as may be due to teachers of public schools for sessions rendered prior to the ratification of the present school law.

ITEMS FROM OUR OXFORD CORRESPONDENT.—Under yesterday's date, our correspondent sends the following: The freshest in Granville last week was a heavy one. The mill-dam at Cannady's mill was washed away and also the bridge which was near the mill.

A barn of tobacco, belonging to Mrs. Col. R. P. Taylor, narrowly escaped being consumed by fire a few days ago. Fortunately the flames were discovered in time to be extinguished before any inquiry except of a very slight nature was sustained. The fire was purely the cause of accident.

On last Wednesday Mr. E. L. Jones informs us that about 10,000 pounds of tobacco were sold at the Tally Ho warehouse, ranging in price from four dollars and five cents to as high as seventy-two dollars per 100 pounds. Sales are made at Tally Ho every Wednesday.

REVENUE BILL. The bill to amend the Constitution of the State so as to make the sessions of the General Assembly biennial instead of annual was taken up and passed its first reading by the requisite two-thirds vote—yeas 80, nays 6.

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LEGISLATURE OF NORTH CAROLINA. SENATE. SATURDAY, Feb. 15, 1873. Senate called to order at 10 o'clock. Lieutenant Governor in the chair. Journal of yesterday read and approved.

By Mr. Averá, a petition from citizens of Kenansville, asking a law to prevent the sale of spirituous liquors within the corporate limits of said town. By Mr. Allen, a petition from citizens of Hertford and Northampton, praying a new county.

By Mr. Price, a petition from citizens of Davidson county, asking permission to sell certain real estate in the town of Lexington. Introduction of Bills. By Mr. Allen, a bill to prevent the sale of spirituous liquors within the corporate limits of Kenansville, Duplin county.

By Mr. Seymour, a bill to repeal chap. 79 laws of 1868-9. By Mr. Waring, a bill to fix the fees of the Coroner of Mecklenburg county, referred.

By Mr. Cawley, a resolution to print the muster rolls of the war of 1812. By Mr. Ellis, of Columbus, a resolution in favor of J. H. Hill.

By Mr. Waring, a resolution of instruction to the Attorney General. The resolution reads as follows: Whereas, it appearing from the statement of D. W. Bain, Chief Clerk of the Treasury Department, made before the Special Committee to investigate the management of the Penitentiary, that Geo. W. Walker, President of the Board of Directors of the Penitentiary, appointed by Gov. Tod R. Caldwell, and upon a warrant signed by the said Tod R. Caldwell, Governor, did draw from the State Treasury the sum of \$7,000, and whereas, it further appears from said statement that the said sum of \$7,000 has neither been returned to the Treasurer nor accounted for, therefore,

Resolved, by the Senate, the House concurring, That the Attorney General of the State be instructed and required, in the name of the State, to institute suit against the said Geo. W. Walker, and his official bond, for the recovery of the sum with all legal interest accrued thereon.

By Mr. Morehead, a resolution providing for night sessions. Adopted. By Mr. Powell, a resolution for the relief of the Lunatic Asylum, provides that \$45,000 be appropriated for the current expenses of the Asylum for the coming fiscal year, to be paid quarterly. Adopted and sent to the House.
