CENTENNIAL CELEBRATIONS. CAVE LIFE AND PROPERTY Col. Bennett introduced in the House on Tuesday night, a series of resolutions looking to the representation of North Carolina in the centennial celebration to be held in the City of Philadelphia. on the fourth day of July 1876, to commemorate the declaration of American Independence.

The resolutions, passed the House, and were at once transmitted to the Senate and promptly adopted by that

On the same evening in the House, Mr. Johnston introduced a series resolutions in favor of holding centennial celebration at Charlotte, N. C., on the 20th of May, 1875, to commemorate the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence. We publish Mr. Johnston's resolutions in full this morning, and believe they will be heartily endorsed by the people of the State.

If Virginia, or almost any other State except our own, could boast of such an historical event as the Mecklenburg Declaration, which was written and adopted more than twelve months before the National Declaration was promulgated, State pride would have made the anniversary a proud and memorable occasion, and its annual observance and celebration would have been sacredly regarded and commemorated.

The celebration contemplated by Mr. Johnston's resolutions, if properly carried out, will prove one of the most interesting occasions that has ever taken place in the State.

The day, the 20th of May, 1875, is more than two years off, and will give ample time for complete arrangements for an exhibition worthy of the cause to be commemorated-worthy of the character and resources of the State.
