OLINA RAILROAD. We published yesterday in full the report of the Committee appointed to investigate the affairs of the Western North Carolina Railroad, and to devise means, if practicable, to prevent the sale of the Road under execution, if consistent with the interest of the State

to prevent the sale. It will be seen that the report of the Committee confirms the material state ments heretofore published by us, and which are contained, substantially, in the Governor's special message to the Legislature on the subject, but the facts in relation to the sale of the Road are stated in the report with greater particularity, and being on the sworn testimony of witnesses, with more auamin't win brane to thenticity.

After a full investigation of all the circumstances connected with the mar agement and pecuniary embarrassments of the Road, the Committee were una ble to discover any fraud, collusion or other complicity between the officers of the Road and outsiders, or any of the witnesses examined by the Committee, and they think there is no good ground that such accusations should longe continue against these gentlemen. The witnesses examined were S. McDowell Tate, President of the Road, J. J. Mott. Ex President, R. F. Simonton, R. Y. McAden, N. W. Woodfin, T. L. Clingman, A. S. Merrimon, and several others. The Committee do not attempt to acquit the management of the Road of the commission of errors, but they say truly, that "it is easier to look back and tell bow errors could have been avaided than to point them out in advance and suggest their cure."

In view of the fact that an appeal has been taken to the Supreme Court of the United States from the decree in the Circuit Court ordering the sale of the Road, and that a decision on said appeal may not be made for years, the Committee think that notwithstanding the appeal, the Circuit Court may order a sale of the Road by consent, on such terms as may be deemed proper and right. They therefore recommend that the Legislature pass a resolution asking the Circuit Court to appoint three persons in addition to the two persons already named for that purpose, and that the five constitute commissioners to sell the Road-title to be retained and the purchasers to be put under ownipulsion to build the Road, beginning

immediately. The Committee then add : "Lest the action of the Court may fail to accord with these suggestions in consequence of supposed want of power in the premises or other cause, your committee recommend the passage of a bill or resolution appointing this Excellency, Tod R. Caldwell, George Davis, ot Wilmington, J. H. Wilson, of Charlottee, M.E. Manley and Walter L. It there be one thing, aside from the dreary routine of material interests, which should claim the attention of the National Legislature, it is the Centennial Celebration of 1876. It claims its atention now, for not a moment is to be lost in putting together and in motion the vast machinery which is to effect so much. It is in itself an object purely National if ever there was one. Its locality must be somewhere, and nowhere beyond the limits of the ter-

ritorial district where nobody dreams of putting it, could it be more appropriately than where the Congress of the We publish in full to-day the Joint revolution did its first great deed. It is idle to deny that one fruit of the great social and political crisis of the last ten years has been to liberalize the views of public men in their construction of the Consti tution. We do not go so far as to say that all or most of the restraints on National Legislation have been swept away. Col. Peyton, formerly of Kentucky, and abrogated for that would amount practically to a change of organic law. But we do say, most emphatically, that here once were doubts and scruples as to the exercise of Federal power, and the objects to which it was to be directed which are as dead and obsolete as the statutes of Westminister, or the Kentucky resolutions. Fancy an ancient doubter like Nathaniel Macon making a speech in Congress now! He would not have half a dozen listeners or command a single vote. This is a truth that cannot be gainsaid. It was this clause which authorized the creation of this very Centennial corporation, and its ancillary Commission. It matured better on the hill and cured better and more yellow than either of the other fertilizers used. I think it is a splendid fertilizer and I expect to use it next season.
