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LEGISLATURE OF NORTH CAROLINA. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

SATURDAY, March 1, 1873. NIGHT SESSION. At 7:30 o'clock Mr. Speaker Robinson called the House to order.

By Mr. Brown, of Mecklenburg, a bill to amend the act for the support of the Lunatic Asylum. Calendar.

By Bowe, col., a bill to amend an act to incorporate the Young Men's Intelligent and Enterprising Association. Referred.

By Mr. Bennett, a resolution in favor of the Principals of the two Houses of the General Assembly.

On motion of Mr. Bennett, the rules were suspended and the resolution passed its several readings.

By Mr. Richardson, a bill in reference to the collection of State taxes in Wayne county for 1870.

On motion of Mr. Richardson, the bill was taken up and passed its several readings.

The bill to change the dividing line between Granville and Franklin counties was taken up and passed its several readings.

On motion of Mr. Blythe, the bill to prevent the sale of liquor to minors was taken up and passed its several readings.

The bill to revive the charter of the Hickory Nut Gap Turnpike was taken up and passed its several readings.

The bill concerning the right of way and places of public worship passed its several readings.

By Mr. Bennett, a resolution in favor of T. F. Lee, Sheriff of Wake County.

On motion of Mr. Bennett the resolution was taken up and passed its several readings.

By Mr. Gidney, a resolution in favor of D. C. Fowie.

On motion of Mr. Gidney, the rules were suspended, and the resolution was taken up and, on motion, was laid on the table.

The bill to amend the charter of the Northwestern N. C. R. R. Company, passed its several readings.

The bill to provide a central place for comparing the election returns of Brunswick County passed its several readings.

The bill to authorize two additional terms of the Superior Court of Granville County passed its several readings.

The resolution concerning sidewalks on State lots in the City of Raleigh was taken up and, on motion, was laid on the table.

The bill concerning the conveyance of convicts was taken up and, on motion, was laid on the table.

The bill to amend section 20, chapter 213, laws of 1871-72 was taken up and passed its several readings.

The resolution in favor of J. H. Ennis was taken up and passed its several readings.

The bill in relation to the penitentiary was taken up, amended, and passed its several readings.

The bill to establish a public ferry across Yackin river, in Forsythe county, was taken up and passed its several readings.

Bill to incorporate a Baptist church in Brunswick county passed its several readings.

Bill to incorporate the Newbern Cooperative Association passed its several readings.

A resolution in relation to the distribution of the laws of 1868 passed its several readings.

The bill to extend the time of registration of grants, &c., in Cumberland county, passed its several readings.

The bill in reference to Pamlico county passed its several readings.

The Lieutenant Governor replied with the following remarks: SENATORS:—The resolution that you have just passed unanimously affords the best assurance that my endeavors, faithful and impartial, I hope they have been, to discharge worthily and properly the duties confided to me, have not been altogether unavailing.

That I am feelingly touched by this voluntary and generous manifestation of approbation and favor, you may believe, but you are not as conscious of it as I am of the deep impression it leaves upon me.

Words are wanting to fully express my appreciation of your uniform kindness to me, and I make the acknowledgment with the deepest sensibility.

Our official intercourse has been pleasant and agreeable, and it will leave its impress and its memories.

"On the sands of our waning years." I am not so vain as to believe that I have not committed errors as the presiding officer of this honorable body, but if so, they were indeed unintentional, and I think I may safely say, that no presiding officer of the Senate has ever been more unanimously sustained in his decisions than I have been.

I know that I have acted fairly and impartially in the performance of my official duties, and you have promptly sustained me on every occasion.

To the public man the approbation of those he has served is his highest reward. For your generous bestowal of that reward, and the indulgence at all times, kindly extended to me, I beg you to accept my grateful acknowledgments.

Permit me, Senators, as the only return which it is now in my power to make, to tender to you the assurance of my great anxiety to unite with you in any and all measures which may be best calculated to encourage and reward honest industry and labor, to develop the resources of the State, to improve our educational interests and facilities, and to promote the permanent peace, prosperity and happiness of all the people of North Carolina.

Your legislation forms a part of the history of the times in which we now live. Much business has been brought before the Legislature, some of it has been carried through, and some has failed.

Let us hope that what has been done is for the best, and that it may receive the approbation of the people.

If in the course of our deliberation, any irritation has been occasioned, or any unkind expressions escaped us, let us, in the spirit of generous friendship, throw over them the mantle of forgetfulness, and recollect only the pleasure arising from association, and the consciousness, which I am sure pervades the bosom of every one, that all have been actuated by a high sense of public duty.

Senators, we must now close our legislative deliberations. The hour for adjournment has arrived. We have to-day to part. I wish each and all of you a speedy and safe return to your families and friends, and that you and they may enjoy a long life of peace, health and happiness.

"Our several engagements now call us away." Our meeting is needful and we must obey.

It remains for me only to announce that the Senate stands adjourned until the third Monday of November next.

At 11:30 o'clock the Senate went into executive session to consider a message from the Governor, concerning the appointments of the Boards of different State institutions. His Excellency stated that, not having had sufficient time to consider the action of the executive session of the Senate, held Saturday afternoon, when his appointments had been considered and a portion of them rejected, he proposed making any further nominations. The Senate then adjourned its executive session until the first Tuesday after the third Monday in November next.

At 1:30 o'clock the Senate adjourned until the third Monday in November next.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. MONDAY, March 3, 1873.

Mr. McNeill introduced a resolution, authorizing the publication of a bill in the Lumberton Reformer, passed several readings.

Mr. Turner introduced a resolution to inquire into charges that the Pennsylvania Central Railroad Company, and other carriers, are running papers to improperly influence legislation. No action taken upon the resolution.

Senate bill to prohibit the sale of liquor at Eador, Chatham county, passed several readings.

House bill, relative to County Claims, passed several readings.

Senate bill to incorporate the Lenoir Locomotive and Car Company, passed several readings.

Senate bill to incorporate the Haw River Iron Company, passed several readings.

Senate bill to repeal chapter 116, Laws 1870-71, passed several readings.

Mr. Gidney introduced a resolution in favor of W. H. Morris, Pesoud, Lee & Co., and J. H. Ennis, which was adopted.

Mr. Badger introduced the following resolution, complimenting Speaker Robinson on the action of the House, which was unanimously adopted:

"The House of Representatives do resolve that, for his impartiality and courtesy, by which kindly and friendly relations have been promoted between the members, and by his strict attention to the duties of his office, and his knowledge of parliamentary usage by which the public business has been greatly forwarded, Mr. Speaker Robinson is entitled to the thanks of this body, and of the people of North Carolina."

Mr. Badger said, that in introducing this resolution, he had expressed his highest conviction, and what he believed to be the unanimous sentiment of the House. In drafting it he had gone out of the ordinary "rule" of complimentary resolutions, and had sought to make it speak the exact truth.

To Mr. Speaker Robinson the House was greatly indebted for the harmonious and friendly feelings that have characterized all of our proceedings. Public business has been greatly forwarded,

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and the true interests of the State, not solely party ends, have been the result of our deliberations. He has been kind and courteous to all the members, but at the same time firm and inflexible in executing his trust. He has displayed a thorough acquaintance with parliamentary law, and a promptness in applying it, that has greatly facilitated the prosecution of our work and saved to the people much expense. The House and North Carolina owe him a debt of gratitude.

Mr. Badger endorsed all that Mr. Speaker Robinson replied as follows: "Gentlemen of the House of Representatives:—"

"I thank you for what you have said, and I should express my appreciation of the kind and flattering manner in which you have expressed yourselves toward me in the resolution just adopted."

"It is gratifying to me, and should be to every North Carolinian, that the asperities and bickerings of party strife are rapidly disappearing from our Halls of Legislation, and a proper State and National patriotism taking its place."

"Your labors have been arduous, and I must say you have been faithful and attentive. Much has been done for the good of North Carolina, and the verdict of the people will be on your side when the results are made known. I am indebted to you for your kind aid and co-operation in the dispatch of public business. A kind Providence has preserved us; the angel of death has passed around our Hall and no member of this House has been called away. Trusting the same powerful arm may protect you and return you to your families and friends, I declare this House adjourned to the 3rd Monday of November next."

The House then adjourned to meet again on the third Monday in November next.
