The work of the Penitentiary which the Messrs. Coleman contracted to build, can be built with brick and by convict labor, for less than two hundred thousand dollars,

The Roads already commenced have received appropriations from the State time and again, but such appropriations been found by experience that voting appropriations to the Railroads does not complete the work. The credit of North Carolina is too much below par in the markets of the world to make appropriations by the Legislature nego tiable. If the State had appropriated two millions of dollars to complete the Western North Carolina Road, the bonds issued for that amount, although secured by mortgage on the road's property, already mortgaged would not

have sold for twenty cents in the dollar ! The bonds of the State issued for similar purposes before the war are quoted in the New York market at from twenty-five to thirty-two cents, and the special tax-bonds at from fourteen to sixteen and a half cents.

The State is not able to pay the interest on the public debt, and farther appropriations for building Railroads in the present condition of the State finances would have only aided in sinking the State's credit still lower in commercial circles. Appropriations could not have served any practical purpose. They would have made the State liable for the full amount named

in the issue of the bonds, but the bonds themselves would have been comparatively worthless, and subject to a ruinous discount. Under such circumstances the principles of political MARCH 9, 1878 economy will justfy the action of the Legislature in not making appropria-

11. In regard to the new school law. On this subject the Recorder says : "The law will not increase the number of schools; but it allows the people to increase the number and efficiency. Now let every Editor in the State fight for the education of the children. It will be a great battle, when the love of

learning meets the love of money." On this matter, we concur with the Recorder, and urge the Editors in this State "to fight for the education of the children." No more important task could devolve upon the editorial profession, and we believe the profession will be equal to the occasion. The question is, not whether we approve the school law in all its details, as it is impossible to frame a law to please everybody, but whether we are to have any public schools in North Carolina

OF INTOXICATING LIQUORS IN CERTAIN LOCALITIES. Section 1. The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact: That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, to sell or give away any intoxicating liquors in any way or manner, or in any quantity, so as to receive any compensation for the same whatever, either directly or indirecty within four miles of Antioch church, in Alleghany county; Bluff Presbyterian church, in Cumberland county; Ashpole Missionary Baptist church, in Robeson county, or Yopp's Meeting House, in Onslew county. Or within three miles of the following places, to-wit: Mount Pleasant Academy, in Cherokee county; Cumberland Union church, near Walkertown, in Cumberland county; Blockers store in Cedar Creek Village, in Cumberland county; Judson Female College, in Henderson county; Pollocksville in Jones county; Laurel Hill hurch, in Richmond county; Big Branch Baptist church, Beauty Spot church, Ashpoie Presbyterian church, Zion's Tabernale Baptist church, Asbury church, Horeb Methodist church, or Mount Mariah Baptist church, in Robeson county; or within two and one half miles of Rocky Nole church, in Cabarrus county ; or within two miles of the following places, to-wit: Piney Grove church, Luneville church, or Red Hill church or School house, in Anson county; Christian Delight church, or Concord church, in Beaufort county ; French's Creek Baptist church, Brown Marsh Pres-byterian church, in Bladen county; Endor Furnace, or Flouring mills in Lockville, in Chatham county; Methodist church, Pres-byterian church, or Baptist church near Fort Hembri, or Hick's High School, Barnard's camp ground, in Clay county; Pleas ant Plains caurch or Percock's store, in Columbus county : Blockville Academy or Cokesberry church, in Cumberland county; New Bridge church, in Duplin county; Mountain Island Factory, in Gaston coun-Johnston's chapel, in Johnston county shiloh church, colored, School House No cense within its corporate limits; or within

Any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof b fore any acting Justice of the Peace, for each and every offence, thirty days.

Sec. 3. The Secretary of the State shall furnish a certified copy of this act, immediately after its ratification to the "Era," "Sentinel" and News for publication. Sec. 4. This act shall be in force from and after the first day of May, A. D., 1873. In General Assembly read three times and
