GRANT'S VISIT TO THE SOUTH -WHY POSTPONED?

There are various reasons given why President Grant changed his mind in regard to his proposed Southern tour. The most reasonable explanation is that the press of public business, occa sioned by the necessity for an extra session of Congress, has induced the President to postpone for a season his contemplated visit.

We do not think that Grant would envying the superior knowledge exbe received now by the people of the South generally, with as much respect and courtesy as they would have extended him a few weeks since. Of course we do not refer to the Radical greeting, which would be cordial at any time.

The South had a right to expect, and did expect, from what had been given out as a quasi authoritative foreshadow. ing of the incoming policy, that the inaugural address would indicate more generous treatment and a kinder feeling towards the Southern States at the hands of the Administration. But in regard to our section, the inaugural maintains an ominous and ungenerous silence. 

this, added to Grant's renewed determination to support and uphold miserable, corrupt, lawless faction in Louisiana, has not made him any new friends in the South, nor increased the anxiety of our people to see him and offer him courtesy and hospitality.

On account of the error, not to say crime of the Administration, Louisiana is to-day deprived of her rightful goveroment, and a handful of conspirators, upheld by Federal bayonets, are outraging all law, and justice, and decency.

So long as such a state of affairs is permitted, encouraged and endorsed by the President of the United States, he has no right to expect that the victims of such tyranny, and their friends and sympathisers, will care to pay mock compliments to a man whose course they condemn and abhor.

It is true the President has exhibited some leniency towards the Ku Klux prisoners, for which we have given him due credit; but we thought that was only the beginning of a policy of justice and magnanimity, and are therefore greatly disappointed that he has tailed to come up to the public expectat.on.

It is perhaps best that he shall postpone his visit to the South indefinitely -or at least until he lifts from the necks of the people of Louisiana the cruel yoke of the Kellogg tyranny and despotism.

He was brought prominently before trial of President Johnston, as one of the Managers of impeachment from the House of Representatives.
