THE GOODRICH MURDER. The New York papers continue to discuss the new sensation-the mysteri

ous murder of Goodrich, in Brooklyn. The dispatches to-day say another woman has been arrested, and is held in confinement on suspicion of being implicated in the murder, but no evidence against her has yet been produced.

The Goodrich murder is exciting almost as much interest as did the great Nathan murder, which occurred in New York two or three years ago, and which has never been cleared up.

CONVICTION OF JOHN C. FRE-MONT.

The Paris dispatches to-day announce Rail Road bonds swindle.

dants charged with swindling in connection with the sale of these bonds in Paris, has been sentenced to five years imprisonment.

Gen. Fremont, who is a native of South Carolina, and who married a daughter of Thomas II. Benton, of Missouri, was the first Republican nominee for the Presidency of the United States. He was defeated by James Buchanan, the Democratic nominee in 1856. Buchanan received one hundred and seventy-four electoral votes; Fremont, one hundred and fourteen, and Millard Fillmore, the Whig candidate, eight.

Gen. Fremont published a letter in the New York papers a few weeks ago, denying all guilty knowledge of the fraudulent sale of the El Paso bonds in France, and asking a suspension of the public judgment until an investigation could be had.

THE REPUBLIC OF SPAIN IN A BAD WAY.

The probable retirement of Castelar, Minister of Foreign Affairs, and Acosta, Minister of War, from the Spanish Cab inet, is announced in recent dispatches from Madrid. If the rumor proves to be true, it will cause considerable embarrassment in the affairs of the Spanish Republic, and may hasten its speedy dissolution.

The Republic claims the sympathy and co-operation of other nations, because of the recent action of the Cortez in passing the emancipation Bill in favor of the Porto Rico slaves; but we doubt whether that measure will be of actual service in propping the fortunes of the new Government.

We stated at the first that we had no faith in the permanency of the Republie of Spain. Events daily transpiring confirm the opinion that it will be of short duration.

The Carlists are committing excesses in various sections, and in many of the Northern provinces they hold undisputed sway.

Mary of the Government troops are at heart in favor of the monarchy, and cannot be relied on in the hour of trial.

The retirement of such distinguished Republican leaders as Castelar and Acosta is ominous, in view of the general discontent and threatened insurrections in many sections of the country, and we would not be surprised to hear at any bour of the sudden collapse of the new Republic of Spain.

SENATORIAL CORRUPTION. The resignation of Caldwell, to avoid expulsion from the United States Senate was followed by the dismissal of the charges in the same body against Clayton, of Arkansas, who had, like Caldwell, been charged with corruption

and britery in securing his seat. The testimoney in Clayton' case is voluminous, filling four hundred printed pages. The majority report of the Committee on Privileges and Elections says that the charges are not sustained, but Mr. Norwood submitted a minority minious retreat from the Senate of the report, inculpating Clayton, and sets forth evidence to sustain his position which seems to us conclusive and unanswerable. 
