Our midnight dispatches yesterday gave some particulars of the disastrous de eat of the detachment of Federal artillery and infantry, which had been sent out to make a reconnoisance in the direction of the Modocs' position.

This detachment was ambushed and signally routed-and, as reported by Col. Green, " the surprise was complete and terrible."

As the soldiers reached the bluff over-Indians opened upon them a severe and murderous fire, which forced them to seek safety in a ravine. Here they were subjected to a cross and enfilading fire, and the Modecs being complete masters of the position, prevented the retreat of the troops that had taken shelter in the ravine by commanding every egress, While in this situation, the soldiers could not expose themselves in any manner without the certainty of being either killed or wounded.

States consisted of two batteries of ality. artillery and one company of intantry. It is not known the exact number of the killed, wounded and missing, as the reports are somewhat conflicting. The dispatch says very few escaped, and the rest were either killed or wounded. Among the officers known to be killed are Capt. Thomas and Lieutenants Howe and Wright. Lieutenant Harr's is wounded, and Lt. Cranston missing.

The Indian force consisted of only twenty-one men-all told, who were armed with breach-loading rifles. What losses they sustained, if any, are not

The gross mismanagement and incom petency of the Federal officers in command of the Modoc camp have brought disaster and disgrace to the Federal

That a blunder has been committed by them is a fact patent to every one who has read the accounts thus far furnished of the complete and terrible surprise which resulted so fatally to the detachment sent out to reconnoitre the position of the enemy.

Such a blunder amounts to a crime, when the lives of soldiers are ruthlessly sacrificed through the want of skill and inefficiency of men educated in military schools and entrusted from their supposed military knowledge and training with the honor of the nation's flag.

No excuse can be offered that will satisfy the public when they learn that twenty one ignorant savages, by strategy and superior skill ignominiously routed three companies of United States soldiers-who lost in killed and wounded twice the number of men the Indians.

Indians had in the fight. The truth of the matter is the Indian chief, Captain Jack, has put our army officers to shame by the exhibition of superior generalship, and taught them a lesson of sad and bitter experience.

We have frequently denounced the treachery of Jack in murdering General Canby and Peace Commissioner Thomas for such conduct cannot be defended on any ground. But there are always two eides to every question, and it frequently happens that the seeds of distrust in the hearts of the Indians towards white themselves.

The fact has been brought to light in Ben White, a coted Indian hunter, invited a number of the Modoc tribe to a peace least, and when he got them all together, his men fired into the crowd potatoes. and killed some thirty or forty.

Now the conduct of Captain Jack in killing Canby was not more treacherous than that of Wright, in killing a number of Modocs who had been invited to a peace feast and were enjoying the hospitalities of the occasion, when tuey were suddenly fired upon in cold blood by the men who had invited them to the conference. To many of the Modocs this feast was converted into a least of death.
