NEW ORLEANS, May 8 .- Gov. Kellogg heard a ball whistle by his ears. The Keliogites forty-one horses and thirty men, strong, with arms and accontrements, left for the Teche country. The Metropolitans marched out of St. Martinsville and back again. Much firing and no blood.

Telegrams have been received here from Governor Kellogg, of Louisiana, addressed to the President and forwarded to him, giving details of the situation in Louisiana. They do not differ materially from the reports already published. A consultation was held at the War Department this morning, there being present General Sherman, Acting Secretary of War Gen.
