removal. That there is great defect somewhere no one has the hardihood to deny. To what cause that defect may be attributed, whether to the inefficiency of the law itself, to the incompetency of judges, to the ingenuity of lawyers, or to each and all of these, it is nevertheless true that persons accused of murder or any other very grave crime, often manage to stave off a trial for months, sometimes for years, and when the trial does take place and a verdict of guilty is pronounced, the chances are that a new trial will be granted ed, either by the Court below or that of the highest appellate jurisdiction in the State where the offence was committed.

The circumstances in Stokes' case which illustrate our position, are familiar to our readers. In the case of Mrs. Clem, of Indiana, accused of the murhad been granted a new trial by the Supreme Court at Indianapolis, this last making the fifth trial she has been allowed by the Courts.

If his execution should take place on the day appointed, and of this there is scarcely a doubt, we will have one instance on record where a murderer was 'tried, convicted and hanged within six weeks after the commission of the offense.

New York might here learn a lesson from Virginia, and in the case of Frank Walworth teach youthful parricides in that State, that such unnatural crimes are too heinous to admit of the laws' delay, but require prompt and summary justice.
