ne There was great rejoicing among the citizens of Norfolk and Portsmouth a few days ago, when it was authorita tively announced that an opposition line, to be owned and centrolled by wealthy dapitalists in New York, would soon compete with the Old Dominion Line for freight between New York and Norfolks) to rerebund

It is true that several ineffectual efforts have been made by different parties to break up the present monopoly by starting new lines in opposition to the Old Dominion: but the latter has so much money that it has been able either to break down or buy out the opposing Richmond Duck.

When the announcement was made that the Lorillards of New York had determined to established a line of steamers of their own to ply between New York and Norfolk, connecting by water with Richmond, the people of the two latter cities were greatly rejoiced at the prospect it afforded them of relief against the exactions and exorbitant demands of an overgrown and heartless monopoly.

On last Wednesday, a beautiful yacht direct from New York and owned by the Lorillards, brought to Norfolk one of the proprietors of the purposed new line and their business agent, who came with the view of purchasing wharf property and making other preparations for the establishment of the Lorillard Line of steamers.

This looks like business, and for the sake of the public at large, we hope the enterprise will be consummated. If this new line is started, the chances are that it will be successful. The Lorillards are immensely wealthy, and it will be no easy matter either to buy them out or to crush them down if they prove to be too strong to be bought out.

The result of this competition with the Old Dominion will be of the most ben, eficial character, not only to the people of Norfolk, Portsmouth and Richmond but to many merchants and farmers in various portions of Virginia, North Carolina, Tennessee and other States that may have occasion to transport their goods and produce via Norfolk to and from New York.

It would be a difficult matter to esti mate the advantage this line will be to the public generally. The reduction in Not only the farmers and merchants in Eastern and Central North Carolina will feel relief at the removal of the pressure which bears so heavily against ther business prosperity, but every trade and profession, every interest of every character in the land, except the transportation monopolies the mselves, is more or less benefitted by having oppressive freights reduced.

Like enormous taxes, high freights eat out the substance of the country, retard material improvement and progress, strike cown the industrial interests of the land, and keep the people in pecuniary embarrassment and poverty.
