He took occasion, during his agency, to acquaint himself with the condition and prospects of the Southern planters, and on his return to Washington City, casually remarked upon the want of organ ization among the farmers in the localities he had visited. The suggestion struck Mr. Kelley forcibly and was put in execution at once. The success which has attended the movement has been remarkable.

In the New York Tribune of the 26th inst., there appears a notice of a new publication, entitled "The Granges of Patrons of Husbandry"written by a lady, giving the history of the : Western farmers' organization. In this work the origin of the Granges is attributed to the farmers to purchase supplies at wholesale prices and from first bands. and for the cultivation of social feelings among the members.

> The Tribune gives the following extract from the new publication, explanatory of the different degrees recognized by the order:

Members admitted to the first degree are known respectively as Laborer and Maid; to the second degree, as Cultivator and Shepcruess; to the third degree, as Harvesterand Glenner; and to the fourth degree, as Husbandman and Matron. The fifth degree is conferred only in the State Granges, which are composed of masters and past-masters of the subordinate Granges, and their wives, who are matrons. Those admitted to this degree are called members of the Pomona or Hope Grange. The sixth degree is conferred only upon members of the Council of the National Grange, which is composed of masters and pastmasters of State Granges, and their wives, who have taken the degree of Pomona. The emblem of this degree is Flora (charity.) The seventh and highest degree is conferred only upon members of the National Senate, which have served one year in that body. The members of this degree are charged with the secret work of the order, and constitute a court of impeachment of all officers of the National Grange. The functions of the Council and Senate are equivalent to to those of representatives and senators in civil legislative bodies. The supreme executive authority of the order is lodged in the Master of the National Grange, at present Mr. Dudley W. Adams, Wankon, Io."

The New York papers are congratulating the public upon the fact that the counsel of young Walworth have refused to avail themselves of legal subterfuges, in order to postpone the trial of their client. To Mr. Charles O'Conor is given the credit of having in this Col.
