THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE "ACT CONCERNING THE CITY OF RAL-EIGH."-Last week, we gave place to the opinion of the Attorney for the city in the construction of the Act amendatory of the charter of the city, which opinion was drawn out by a clerical omission, which appeared to have excluded a portion of the city from the operations of the Act. Below will be found a communication from the Hon. W. N. H. Smith, which expresses opinions diametrically opposite. published a letter written by Q Busbee, Esq., the legal adviser of the authorities of the City of Raleigh, in answer to an application from the Mayor as to the proper construction light brown shading into a delicate of the first section of the act recently passed by the General Assembly, In this letter, the opinion is expressed A nevelty is introduced in plaids that all that portion of the city below the boundary of the First Ward east of East Street and North of Martin Street is not included within any of the wards, and that citizens residing therein carriot participate in the election of city officers and do not

share in the public burdens. Differing entirely in the conclusions arrived at, I desire to submit very succinctly the reasons for this

dissent. It is a rule of construction, universally accepted, and applied to writings, founded alike in authority and reason, where there is an apparent repugnancy in its provisious, that the general intent to be ascertained from the entire instrument must prevail over a particular intent manifested in some of its parts, if they cannot be reconciled. This rule rests upon the principle that every such writing has an object, and if practicable, to give an interpretation which will accomplish that object. It is especially applicable to acts of legislation affecting public interests, such as is this amended charter. Let us now examine the first section of the Act, and the language used therein out of which the supposed difficulty arises, and see if the exclusion of any part of the territorial limits of the city as existing at the time of the passage of

the Act is admissible. I. The very first words used are "that the City of Raleigh shall be divided into five wards;" not a part, but the entire city, with its present boundaries, should be constituted of five wards. It is declared in express terms that the entire city shall be distributed into these five political divisions. The boundaries are not to be restricted, enlarged or changed. but to remain as they then were.

11. The boundary of the First Ward is thus described: "Beginning at the intersection of Davie and Wilmington streets, thence East with the central line of Davie street to its intersection with Bloodworth street, thence along the line of Bloodworth street to Martin street, then East along the central line of Martin street to East street, thence North with the central line of East street to its intersection with Jones street, thence East with the central line of Jones street to the city line, thence with the line of the city, Eorth and West, to Wilmington street, and South with the central line of Wil-

mington street to the beginning." Then follows the description of the boundaries of the Second Ward in these words:

"Beginning at the intersection of Davie and Wilmington streets, thence with the boundaries of the First Ward, east with Davie street, north with Bloodworth street, east with Martin street to the city line, thence with the boundaries of the chy, south and west to the Fayetteville road, thence northwardly up the centre of said road to the centre of South street to its intersection with Wilmington street, thence north with the central line of Wilmington street

to the beginning. It will be noticed that in describing the common boundary line between the two wards, the words used are not precisely the same in defining the limits of each. East and Jones streets are mentioned by name as constituting a part of the dividing li. e in the description of one and are nigitted in the other Ward. In other respects the definition is the same in

each The beginning point, the intersection of Davie and Wilmington streets, is common in both. The line of the Second Ward runs "thence with the boundaries of the First Ward East. and these, words, had there been no other, would have fully and accurately defined the line of the Second Ward. But these additional words follow, "with Davie street, North with Bloodworth street, East with Martin street to the city line," Which are an imperfect description of the line, in not naming, all the streets along which it runs until arriving at the city limits. Does this incomplete enumeration of streets change the full and accurate description contained in the preceding words, and this too, where it results in excluding a portion of the city from every Ward? The description is accurate as far as i goes, but it directs the line to run from Martin street to the city line and does not determine how and by what route the city limit is to be reached. Martin street does not extend to the city limits. It is intercepted by private grounds.
