A full account of the general proceedings of the grand Centennial having already been detailed in the News, we propose to devote this article chiefly to our Raleigh boys for the benefit of our Local readers. The good order, fine display and excellent deportment of the various organizations from Raleigh entitle ihem more than a brief passing notice, especially as they are called upon to Centennialize only once in a hundred

THE RALEIGH LIGHT INFANTRY, Capt Basil C. Manly, commanding, reached the Centennial city "safe and sound" Wednesday morning at o'clock, and were received in due form by Capt Harry's Mecklenburg Zouaves and escorted to "camp" at the foot of King Street, near the A T. & O. R. R. depot. On the march through the city to camps the soldierly bearing, and fine appearance of this company was the theme of general remark, and old army officers spoke of their drilling in terms of highest praise. It was not to be wondered at then, that the company was honored in the grand parade with the "Post of Honor," as the escort to the honored invited guests.

On the parade their movement and deportment was especially observed, and modesty forbids us from stating the opinion of two army officers as the Raleigh Light Infantry (the new Company) passed their position on the street. "Where all did well, it would seem invidious to discriminate," therefore we will say no more in their favor. They were the recipients of many receptions in the city by the most distinguished citizens and were presented with a handsome boquet by Mrs. Stonewall Jack.

On Friday, the Company paraded the streets, called on Gov. Vance, Mayor Johnson, Col. Thos. Dewey, Mrs. Stonewall Jackson and others, at each place firing a salute. THE RALEIGH LIGHT ARTILLERY. This handsomely uniformed and well equipped company, commanded by Capt. A. B. Stronach, Lts.
