Of his early years we know but little. His early pursuits were connected with mechanics, and it is said that he was one of the carpenters engaged in building the first Court House in Ashville. But his mind was vigorous and active, and he was fire by ambition to display talents he felt he possessed, in more ptellectual avocations. He applied himself to the study of the law, we think under the late Gov. Swain, and upon his admission to the bar soon made his way to the top of his profession. He without doubt ranked as the first lawyer of the West for a number of years, and his reputation throughout the State put him on an equal footing with the ablest every where within its borders. He was remarkably successful as a criminal lawyer, but his sound judgment, his quick appreciation, and his in lefatigable industry made him equally realy and powerful in eases either criminal or eivil. The ardent nature of Mr. Woodfin always made him active and prominent in politics. Without being strictly a popular man, the soundness of his judgment, and the liberality of his views, always looking to the improvement and advancement of his section, gave him a hold upon the confidence of his large constituency which remained unbroken for many years, and which only had a shock from the diversities of opinion which preceded and accompanied the late civil war. Previous to the call for a Convention in the winter of 1861, Mr. Woodfin had been an ardent Union man. His views underwent a change and he was a zealous member of the Convention of May which passed the ordinance of Secession. Mr. Woodfin was ardent in fact in everything to which he applied himself, and the activity of his brain found employment as well in the pursuits of private life as of public life.
