THE KIND OF LEAD IN PENCILS. -The "lead" in lead pencils is not lead at all, though it is called "black lead." The weight, if nothing else, tells you that. It is a mineral, called graphite, (from the Greek word to write,) and is more nearly related to coal thau to lead. You have learned that both coal and the diamond are forms of the element, carbon. Graphite is still another shape in which carbon is found: it usually contains a very little iron. Plumbago is another name for it. It can not be melted, but at a very high heat will burn. The fine kinds are very scarce.

Federal Decoration Day-Interesting Ceremonies-the Blue and the Grey Commingling for the First Time-Eloquent Prayer, Poem and

Yesterday afternoon was observed as Federal Decoration Day in our midst. The programme as announced was strictly carried out. The troops from Federal camp marched down to the Courthouse green at 41 o'clock, joined by the Raleigh Artillery, Capt. A. B. Stronach commanding, and by the Light Infantry, Capt. B. C. Manley commanding, and proceeded by the Stanley band, marched to the Federal Cemetery, just east of the

Arriving at the Cemetery the audience was conducted to the grand stand prepared for the speakers and the special guests of the occasion, and the services were opened by prayer from the Rev. Mr. Marshal, a prayer exceedingly appropriate to the occasion. Then followed the recitation of the poem, "The Blue and the Grey," by J'ol 1. J. Young, preceded by appropriate remarks. [From Charlotte Observer of Sunday. THE RAILROAD CASE.

Its Hearing at Chambers Yesterday. -The Defendants Discharged from Custody-vuopses of Argument and the Order in the Case.

We mentioned yesterday that His Honor, Judge Schenck, had issued a writ of habeas corpus to have before him at Chambers yesterday after-tioon, A. S. Buford, President of the Richmond and Danville Railroad. and W. H. Green, Master of Transportation of the same, for violation of a statute in altering the gauge of the North, Carolina Railroad. The case was heard at 5 o'clock, P. M. Messrs, F. N. Strudwick, J. H. Wilson and W. J. Montgomery, appearing for the State, and Judge Mar-shall, of Richmoud, Va., and Capt. S. A. Ashe, of Raleigh, for the petitioners. The crowd present in the Court House was not large, but 1epresented nearly all the business interests of the city. The railroad men of the place were all out, and great

nterest was manifested by all. The case was opened by Mr. Strudwick, Solicitor of the 5th District, reading the return of the officer Scott, stating that he held the petitioners. A. S. Buford and W. H. Green, under a warrant for changing the gauge of the North Carolina Railroad rom Greensboro to Goldsboro.

Mr. Ashe moved the discharge of the prisoners, because the act under which the arrest was made, was void. He claimed that the Act was in violation of the Constitution of North Carolina, Art. I, section 17, which provides that no person shall be deprived of his property except by the aw of the land, and secondly, that it iolated that provision of the Const. the United States, prohibiting any tate from passing any law violating he obligation of contracts. Under the first branch, he insisted

that as the Act was in its terms plainly repugnant to Art. 1, sec. 17, onstitution of North Carolina, uness it could be supported on some the acknowledged principles creating exceptions to that section. He said the principle of Eminent Domain could not apply, because there was no just compensation offered or provided for in the act. That if it could be supported at all it must national salute was fired by a battery | be under the principle that the State could make general police regulations which may effect rights and

> He discussed this matter at some length, quoting authorities to show the limits which the courts had ever faced to the exercise of this power. That the regulations must be to provide for the comfort of the citizens or the protection or safety of property or person.

> Under this head, fell the right to regulate commerce, to regulate the speed of railroad cars, to blow up louses in times of fires. &c. But it had never been extended to interfering with the gauges of railroads. He challenged the production of any authority to the contrary. It must be, indeed a police regula-

tion, and not an attempt to deprive a corp gration of a substantial right. If the Legislature should attempt to do this, under cover of a police regulation, its act was void. He then discussed the other question involving the impairment of the contract, conned in the charter. He was followed by Solicitor Strudwick, who spoke of the State system

of Internal Improvement adopted long ago by our forefathers, and claimed that the act was within the power of the Legislature-a very proper and desirable act. That it was for the purpose of regulating com-He read some extracts, in print,

from a very able paper heretofore pre pared by that eminent lawyer, B. F. of Raleigh, wherein Mr. Moore fully discussed the whole mat-

He further claimed that His Honor could not discharge the prisoners who were held under the warrant of the

magistrate. Mr. S. made a strong speech but we were not able to follow him as exactly as we could have wished. J. H. Wilson, Esq. then made a long and able argument touching our railroad system, and claiming that this act of assembly was the proper exercise of a power to regulate com-

merce within this State. This power had been held to exist in the State Legislature, by the Supreme Court of the United States in the care of Nisey vs. Moore. It was the power to regulate com merce. It was a sovereign power. All

states held and exercised it. He quoted State is Matthews, one of our State decisions in support of this position-and made an elaborate and able argument showing that the principles involved were the same as in the case on trial.

The charter of the Bank of Fayetteville, of which Mathews was cashier, was silent as to the issues of the Bank. An act was passed by the Legislature subsequent to the granting of the charter of the Bank, making it a crimnal offence for any Bank to issue notes under a certain denomination. The Bank of Fayetteville continued to issue notes under the prescribed denomination in deflance of the law. The cashier was indicted and the Supreme Court decided the law unconstitutional, although it was argued by his counsel that the charter was a contract between the State and the Bank and the Legislative enactment was in violation of the same; but the Supreme Court held that the silence of the charter on the subject left it within the power of the Legislature to control the issues of the Bank under sovereign power to regulate the commerce of the State. He argued that the principles involved in this case were the same. That the charter of the N. ('. Railroad was silent as to the gauge, but the 4 feet 81 inches had been adopted by this and other railroads, and the State had the inalienable right to prevent a change of the same, or to cause a change of gauge to be made.

Judge Marshall in reply made a powerful argument. The points taken by this gentleman were: 1. That the charter of the N. C. R. R. C. was a contract between the State of N. Carolina and the corpora-

2. That this contract had been the subject of judicial construction by the Supreme Court of the State. 3. That according to this construction, the N.C. R. R. Co. had the right under this charter to adopt any gauge that to it seemed fit-and to change it as the interest of the Com-

pany might in its view require. 4 That this contract thus continued could not be impaired by any subsequent legislation without violating the constitution of the United States which declares that no State shall impair the obligations of contracts. 15. That the law under which the prosecution against Buford and Green was commenced, undertook to deprive the N. C. R. R. Co. of its rights-unquestionable rights under its charter and contract, and was consequently unconstitutional and

6. That the R. &. D. R. R. Co. had by the Deed of Lease of the N. C. R. R. Co. all the rights of its Lessor -and that the Supreme Court had

so declared. He also read the act of assembly of the 15th March, and undertook to show that it was so drawn as not to carry out the intention of its framers-and that even if the act was not liable to the objection as to its impairing the obligation of a contract, the prisoners were not embraced within its provisions, if they did alter the gauge of the N. C. Road. He also commented upon the position taken by the counsel for the State, that it was the policy of the State of North Carolina, that all railroads shall be of the gauge of 4 feet 8} inches, and undertook to show that the State had adopted no such policy, and he gave the names of as many railoads in the State of other gauges as could be found of those of 4 81.
