Johnson, J. A. Adams and F Johnson. After a short absence, the committee reported the following resolutions, which were unanimous-

ly adopted: WHEREAS, It is the duty of all good citizens to interpose their influence, at all times, and under all circumstances, in the protection of the helpless and innocent, and the punishment of the vicious and guilty,

WHEREAS, The cruel and atrocious murder and mutilation of the bodies of Mrs. Partin and her infant, teur months old, by her husband and other parties, has no parallel in the past history of the world, either savage or civilized, Therefore

Resolved, That we, the citizens of Johnston, Wake and Harnett counties present, resolve ourselves into a committee of vigilance, for the purpose of bringing to speedy justice the perpetrators of the horrid murder of Mrs. Partin and her infant.
