A PROBABLE FATAL AFFRAY. Mr. Samuel Merrill, a Citizen of Raleigh, stabbed in the Breast in a Difficulty at Forestville, and in a Sinking Condition.

PARTICULARS OF THE SAD AFFAIR. [SPECIAL TO DAILY NEWS] FORESTVILLE, N. C., July 27. After the Convention candidates had finished speaking at this place this afternoon an unfortunate, and it is feared fatal affray occurred between Samuel Merrill, Esq., of Raleigh, and Richard Thompson, of this place.

Mr. Merrill, with a knife in the left breast near the heart, inflicted, the Doctors think, a fatal wound. Up to this hour, 8 1/2 p. m., the wounded man is alive but is slowly sinking, and no hopes are entertained of his recovery.

THE NEWS OF THIS SAD AFFAIR caused much excitement in our community last night. Mr. Merrill being well and favorably known in this community, and at 9 o'clock a special train left the R. & G. Depot to convey the wife of Mr. Merrill, his family physician, and several members of his Lodge of Odd Fellows, of which order he is a high official, for the purpose of bringing him to Raleigh if possible.

Mr. Thompson, the man who inflicted the fatal wound, is a moulder by trade, worked for some years at the Separk foundry in this city, and has recently been engaged at the foundry at Forestville. The origin of the difficulty, it is thought, was the fact that Thompson was in debt to Merrill for groceries, which debt the latter was endeavoring to collect.
