THE SAD ACCIDENT AT DURHAM - DEATH OF YOUNG AUSTIN. - A correspondent, writing us from Durham under date of Friday evening, gives us the following additional particulers of the sad and fatal accident at "About 4 o'clock this p. m. a large

crowd of our young men, feeling enthusiastic over the result of the election yesterday, gathered on the Common adjoining the North Carolina railroad for the purpose of firing the cannon. Round after round followed in rapid succession until the gun became very warm, when, owing to improper mobbing the gun was prematurely discharged, blowing off both the hands of P. W. Austin, a young Irishman and painter by trade, also blowing off the left hand of John B. Morris, a young man and most worthy citizen of our town; also distiguring the face of Morris, if not putting out his lett eve, besides mangling the thumb on the left hand of Capt J. F. Freeland, of whom, for sterling worth, the State fails to produce a superior. Austin, it is thought, sustained internal injuries, besides the loss of both hands, and will most likely die. His hands were blown off above the

STATE OF THE GROCERY MARKET. -The following from the American Grocer, published in New York, being of general as well as of local in-

terest, we copy it into these columns:

"Whether the expectations which have been entertained of an improved condition of trade for the present year are to be realized or not, the next sixty days will determine. That these hopes of revival have not been sanguine is true, but the disappointment which may follow their nonfulfillment will be none the less serious. With the exception of a few unimportant localities, the agricultural production has been unusually large, and the favorable prices that prevail for several leading products ought to stimulate an early realization. The movement of crops is the old fashioned legitimate machinery by which to get money into circulation and thus increase the purchasing and debt-paying power of the people, especially in the agricultural localities. That this would be a vital step toward improvement in the trade, none will deny following as it does two years of great economy, and in view of small stocks of merhandise and exceptionally low prices for all staples. Great manufacturing centres and important importing ought to be benefitted by the absorption of accumulated stocks of goods, and the whole country should feel the thrill of new life in business. We are therefore, on the eve of a most important and critical season in the commercial history of the country and close observers will watch with some anxiety the indications which the next few weeks will afford."
