ADJOURNMENT. On Monday, at 6 p. m., as the sun losed its daily record and set behind the hill with a modest blush of concious greatness, the Constitutional Convention of 1875 closed its work, and with a modest consciousness of time well spent and of labor devoted to the maintenance and furtherance of the public weal, set its seal to the new Constitution of North Carolina, and sent it forth to the sovereign people to wait their decision and their plaudits, "Well done, good and faithful servants." The scene, in adjourning, was just such as we would have expected, from the character of the men composing this historic and, in many respects, remarkable body; and when we compare it to that which closed the proceedings of the Convention of 1868, the disgraceful orgies that c-lebrated the annihilation of all that was North Carolina's proud boast, we are led to hope that a new era has dawned upon our dear old State, and that the time is not far distant when she will be able to throw off the character given her by the wolves and vampires that inaugurated the "new order of things," and re-assume the good, honest name that had become a proverb all over our land. The people now have an opportunity of putting their heels upon the hydra of radicalism and crushing out its life. Will they do it?
