FARMING INTERESTS.

the President and Faculty, gives the For stolidity, persistence and strict attention to business, commend us to the plant called alfalfa. Neither drought, chinch bugs nor grasshopers seem to disturb its serenity. We have 1½ acres upon the college farm that was seeded April 8, 1875, to alfalfa. To day, June 7th, the ground is completely occupied with a dense, even growth of this valuable forage. From this mass we have selected plants that measured sixteen inches above the ground. The roots broke off at ten inches, and doubtless extended several inches beyond this point. If alfalfa keeps ita good name luring the coming season, many acres will be seeded in this vicinity in 1879. Who knows but what the introduction of alfalfa may mark the turning point in our agriculture, just as the introduction of clover and turnips one hundred and fifty years ago, marked a new era in the agriculture of Great Britian?

Lime vs. Ashes

Place a piece of iron or steel in damp ashes, and it will corrode with rust. Place the iron or steel in lime mortar, and it will remain bright and the rust will disappear. Sow small grain where a log heap or brush pile has been burned, or where a liberal dressing of ashes has been applied, and there will be a rank growth that will probably fall and never mature. Sow the grain where lime has been applied to the soil, and the grain will grow stout, stiff straw, and plump, hardy heads that mature well. Ashes cause a rank growth of the

herbactous parts of plants, such as leaves, straw and grass; lime induces the growth of the woody part of plants, and the grain or fruit. Ashes stimulate heavy muck, and rich or virgin soils. They seem to act especially on vegetable mould and manure from the barnyard. Apply them to the most offensive pile of compost, and they will render it inodorous and worthless as a fertilizer, their effect being that of releasing the ammonia from the compost. Ashes used with a compost heap of decaying vegetable matter would be wastedworse than wasted-as they render ne compost inert as a fertilizer. Ap plied to an offensive sink, sewer or cesspool, they serve an excellent purpose as a disinfectant. They promote the growth of grass and forage especially, proving very valuable on ow lands; will stimulate trees, etc., to a vigorous growth when the soil

and injure poor ones. Lime improves poor soil, especialy sandy ones by rendering them more compact and capable of retainng fertility when applied. As a romoter of health and vigor in apde trees it is one of the best applies. ons that can be made to the soil. Under its influence trees mature well, the fruit is finer, and trees are freer from disease. Lime may be applied with benefit on most soils and many plants, but is of special value to the apple tree and strawberry plant, while ashes are valuable on heavy or rich soils for the grosser feeding of plants such as our native plums and current bushes.-A. L. Hatch in Horticulturalist.
