Ordinance providing for the submission to the voters of the city of Raleigh the question of an issue of \$70,-Whereas, It is provided in section

13, chapter 80, of Private Acts of 1874-'75, that the present debt of the city of Raleigh shall be funded, and since by Art. VII., sec. 7, of the Constitution, it was declared that "no city, &c., shall loan its credit, pledge its faith, &c., unless by a vote of a majority of the qualified voters thereand.

Whereas, a meeting of the citizens of Raleigh of all parties recommended to the Board of Aldermen to submit to the voters of the city a proposition to fund the bonds of the city yet out standing which have never been submitted to the roters, and the legally issued scrip, upon the basis of 75 cents on the dollar; now therefore, in pursuance of said recommenda-

Be it ordained, that the question be submitted to the voters of the city of Raleigh whether the city shall issue its bonds to the amount of seventy thousand dollars, payable in twenty and thirty years after date, bearing interest at six per cent per annum, the coupons being receivable for taxes. These bonds to be issued in lieu of the city bonds now outstanding which have never been submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of the city, and of the city serip or city orders issued by former Board of Commissioners upon the basis of seventy-five cents for every dollar, principal and interest of said bonds and scrip: Provided, that no bond or scrip shall be funded until it has been approved by a Committee of the

Board of Aldermen. Be it further ordained. That the issue of bonds if approved shall be made under direction of the Board of Aldermen, in denominations from \$50, to \$500. The authority granted shall cease and determine on the 1st day of January, 1877, and the funds

ing shall cease on that date. Be it further ordained. That the question of the issue of the bonds shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the city on the 14th day of January 1876, those approving such issue voting approved. and those not approving voting "not approved." Western N. C. Tobacco Crop. At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the North Carolina Agricultural Society held in this The following ordinance providing | city on the 9th inst., Col. Shelton of Asheville was called upon for information as to his experience in the culture of tobacco in the county West of the Blue Ridge. He has done so in the following remarks which we

present to our readers. Cel. Shelton is a Virginian, and lived until the past few years in the most favored part of the Virginia tobacco region. He carried the experience of many years with him to the county of Buncombe, and has conducted his operation on a large and successful scale. He is emphatically the pioneer of tobacco culture in Buncombe, for though long raised there, it was only for home nse, never for market.

The following is an extract from his remarks:

EXTRACT OF THE REMARKS OF COL.

SHELTON. The culture of tobacco in Western North Carolina is now a settled fact. Thousands of pounds of fancy wrappers are now produced, where ten years ago, the crop was scarcely known. I am not here to speak of the advantages of our transmontane section, but of the culture of tobacco. New things are continually developing in this important branch of agriculture. It would doubtless be interesting to this committee to trace the meanderings of this almost romantic subbject. The effect it has upon and will exercise over the finances of this government will be admitted by all. That it is a useless article in the abstract, I am willing to admit, but the money it brings, the interest it developes, cannot be lightly spoken of. I will now only revert to the fact that I have made this useless crop my life time study. I have made many assaults on old fogyism in my career, but the most important is to tell the tobacco planter that he has wasted thousands of dollars in curing a useless cumbrous stalk when he could have done otherwise; to tell him that he only sends the leaf to market, and that all the money he spends upon the stalk is money thrown away, and that he ought to divide his grist instead of carrying a stone in the other end of the sack. There is one point I wish particularly to call his attention to. He loses ten percent of the weight of his tobacco by curing it on the stalk. Nature's God has ordained that all yegetation in dying or drying up sends its substance back to its original stalk. The corn, the grass, the leaves everything speaks this truth in lessons not to be misunderstood. Can tobacco be exempted from this law of nature? I

have experience on this subject. 100 plants of green tobacco weighed 230 pounds, one half of this was cured on the stalk, and one half off the stalk. The naked stalks were also cured.

Result : that cured off the stalk -Stalks weighed

ths. oz. Cured on the stalk, 11. 06 Stalk on this top, 8.

You will observe that the grand total is just the same except one ounce, and in this lot cured off the stalk I gain 15 ounces or something like 8 per cent on the leaf, while the other gains one pound, but that gain is in a worthless stalk. Comment is unnecessary.
