Fire and Death-A Bull Dog Makes

Yesterday morning two outhouses belonging to the Cottage Hotel were burnt to the ground. In the house where the fire caught Mary Aun Dolan, aved 25, and the daughter of Patrick Dolan the proprietor of the hotel, perished in the flames. It seems the cook had left the kitchen and fastened the cor and the young woman being idiotic was kept in this kitchen confined in a small enclosure built near the fireplace so as to be comfortable, and the end towards the fire was of lattice work. Mr. Dolan was from home and Mrs. Dolan the mother was afar off in the office room of the hotel out of hearing of the screams of her daughter. About eleven o'clock Betsy Henly a colored woman who lived in the adjoining outhouse that was burnt saw the smoke wreathing from the top of the kitchen and ran and looked through the slats of the window and says she saw the flames twisting up and heard the young woman scream one time, "her last holler I reckon," said Betsy. She ran to the room where sat Mrs. Dolan in company with another lady and told her the kitchen was on fire-and then it was the mother sprang into the yard with an axe in her hand and burst open the kitchen door and the flames leaped in her face and threw her back but she rushed in again, her lady friend trying to hold her and would have perished with her daughter, but a colored man seized her and dragged her back, and just then a stout bull dog flew at the negro and fought him like a fiend biting his hand badly. The house burnt so quickly it was nearly to the ground when the firemen arrived. They drew the poor girl out with hooks. Both arms and egs were burnt off and hardly anvthing remained of her head but the brains. The buil dog we hear has been with Mr. Dolan thirteen years and seemed perfectly devoted to his daughter, going in with her at night when they would carry her to the house to put her to bed and sleeping by her door. The girl was subject to fits and once when she was in the field cathering fruit the dog ran to Mr. Dolan and by his actions made him go to the field where he found her on the ground.
