The Gold Misery Case. The case of the negro Jacob P. Davis against Frank Ferreil the keeper of the county work-houand his assistants Isaac Holderfield. Ben Matthis and Weston Rogers, for violent usage while a prisoner at the work-house, was on examination before Magistrate Magnia in tho court' house yesterday. Messrs. Strong, C. M. Busbee and Argo, represent the plaintiff and Messrs. Fullet and Snow the defendant. There are five separate warrants and prosecutions against the defendants. A crowd of witnesses appear for the plaintiff, all work-house prisoners. dirty and ragged and black. The negro plaintiff who found the gold Jacob Davis was called first to make his statement. He looked treaser dead than alive and was allowed to be seated while giving his evidence. last year at the first Fall term of court. He was sent there to work five dollars. He mauled, picked cotton and cleaned up new grounds. About the last of February he was working in the new grounds near an old tree that had been blown up and the ground was burst up between the two roots and right there he dug into a tin box, and snatched it out, slipped the catch - back, and found it full of gold. Mr. Matthis the guard was standing near at the time. He, Davis put the box in his pocket and carried it with him from his work to his cell. Mr. Rogers saw him with it while he was counting the money in his cell, Mr. Rogers was the night watch. He told Rogers about it. He counted as much as \$300 in ten and twenty dollar gold pieces. The next day he carried the box back to the field and bld if in a stunin hole like a possum nole in the ground, and then threw trash over it. Tuesday afortnight after that while he was down at prayers

in the morning he heard from his cell window Mr. Holderfield say to Buffalo, one of the convicts, "Buffalo, don't come here with a lie in your mouth, where's that box of gold Davis found ?" Buffalo replied, ask Davis. Where is he? He's at prayers Get him up, get him up, and then Holderfield had him brought out and asked him for the gold and threatened him with Ferrell the keeper of the workhouse. We were shown on yesterday by a gentleman in this city some very valuable specimens of gold ore taken from a muse recently opened in Chatham county, which promises to become one of the richest mines in the State. One piece of the precious metal shown to us is valued at sevenv-five dollars, and we are assured that there is plenty more just like it. A box of the ore has been sent to our worthy State Geologist, and is on exhibition in the State Museum. The mine is on a tract of land leased by Messrs, J. J. Jackson and H. A. London, Jr., and Hon, John Manning, of Pittsboro, N. C., and has been sufficiently opened by these gentlemen to test its extent and great value. We learn that they purpose uniting with certain Northern capitalists and forming a joint stock company. so as to erect the proper machinery and go to work on an extensive scale. A good deal of work has already been done, three shafts having been sunk to a depth of fifty feet, and tunnels connecting them about three hundred feet in length, and throughout the entire distance was found a vein of good ore varying in thickness from 6 inches to 4 feet. The ore is of rich quality, and is pronounced by those who have seen it to be equal to the ore of the famous Gold Hill mine. and is known to miners as "the brown ore." Fx-Gov. Warmouth as Pinchbach's Successor.

A report is current in Washington that Kellogg has appointed ex-Governor Warmouth to the vacancy which exists in the Senate by the reection of Pinchback. Warmouth has gained greatly in popularity in New Orleans during the past few mouths, and if he has been appointed it is the hope of a unity of the liberal element in the Republican party with the regular organization in order to carry the State at the next election. The question has been raised whether Kellogg has the right to fill an original vacancy in the Senatorial delegation from Louisiana.
