**OFFICIAL.**  
BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF  
AMERICA.  
A PROCLAMATION.  
WHEREAS additional articles to the  
General Convention of Friendship, Com-  
merce, and Navigation between the  
United States and Denmark, of the 26th  
of April, 1826, were concluded and  
signed by the respective Plenipotenti-  
aries of the parties, at Washington,  
on the eleventh day of July last, which  
additional articles, being in the English  
and French languages, are word for  
word as follows:—  
ARTICLE I.  
To the General Convention of Friend-  
ship, Commerce and Navigation, con-  
cluded at Washington on the 26th day  
of April, 1826, between the United  
States of America and His Majesty the  
King of Denmark.  
The United States of America and  
His Majesty the King of Denmark,  
wishing to favor their mutual commerce  
by affording, in their ports, every ne-  
cessary assistance to their respective  
vessels, the undersigned Plenipotenti-  
aries, being duly empowered for that pur-  
pose, have agreed upon the following  
additional articles to the General Con-  
vention of Friendship, Commerce and  
Navigation, concluded at Washington  
on the twenty-sixth day of April, 1826,  
between the contracting parties.

**ARTICLE I.**  
The respective Consuls-General, Consuls,  
Vice-Consuls and Commercial  
Agents, shall have the right as such to  
sit as judges and arbitrators in such dif-  
ferences as may arise, either at sea or  
in port, between the captain, officers and  
crew of the vessels belonging to the na-  
tion whose interests are committed to  
their charge, particularly in reference  
to the adjustment of wages and the exe-  
cution of contracts, without the interfe-  
rence of the local authorities, unless the  
conduct of the crew and the officers, or  
of the captains, should disturb the order  
or tranquility of the country.  
It is however understood that this  
species of judgment or arbitration shall  
not deprive the contending parties of  
the right they have to resort on their  
return to the judicial authority of their  
country.

**ARTICLE II.**  
The Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-  
Consuls and Commercial Agents are  
authorized to require the assistance of  
the local authorities for the search, ar-  
rest and imprisonment of the deserters  
from the ships of war and merchant ves-  
sels of their country. For this purpose  
they shall apply to the competent tri-  
bunals, judges and officers, and shall in  
writing demand said deserters, proving  
by the exhibition of the registers of the  
vessels, the rolls of the crews, or by other  
official documents, or, if the vessel  
shall have departed, by copy of said  
documents duly certified by them, that  
such individuals form part of the crew;  
and on this reclamation being thus sub-  
stantiated, the surrender shall not be  
refused, unless there be sufficient proof  
of the said persons being citizens or  
subjects of the country where their sur-  
render is demanded. Such deserters,  
when arrested, shall be placed at the  
disposal of said Consuls-General, Con-  
suls, Vice-Consuls or Commercial Agents  
and may be confined in the public pris-  
ons at the request and cost of those who  
shall claim them, in order to be detained  
until the time when they shall be re-  
stored to the vessels to which they be-  
longed or sent back to their own coun-  
try by a vessel of the same nation, or  
any other vessel whatsoever. But if  
not sent back within three months from  
the day of their arrest, they shall be set  
at liberty, and shall not be again ar-  
rested for the same cause.  
However, if the deserter should be  
found to have committed any crime or  
offense, his surrender may be delayed  
until the tribunal before which his case  
shall be depending shall have pron-  
ounced his sentence, and such sentence  
shall have been carried into effect.

The present additional articles shall  
have the same force and value as if they  
were inserted, word for word, in the  
convention signed at Washington on the  
twenty-sixth day of April, one thousand  
eight hundred and twenty-six, and being  
approved and ratified by the President  
of the United States, by and with the  
advice and consent of the Senate there-  
of, and by His Majesty the King of  
Denmark, the ratifications shall be ex-  
changed at Washington within 6 months  
from the date hereof, or sooner, if pos-  
sible.

In faith whereof, we, the undersigned,  
in virtue of our respective full powers,  
have signed the present additional ar-  
ticles, and have thereto affixed our  
seals.  
Done in triplicate at the city of Wash-  
ington, on the eleventh day of July, in  
the year of our Lord one thousand eight  
hundred and sixty-one.

And whereas the said additional ar-  
ticles have been duly ratified on both  
parts and the respective ratifications of  
the same were exchanged in the city of  
Washington, on the eighteenth instant,  
by William H. Seward, Secretary of  
State of the United States, and W. R.  
Raasloff, Charge d'Affairs of His Ma-  
jesty the King of Denmark in the Uni-  
ted States, on the part of their respec-  
tive governments.  
Now, therefore, be it known that I,  
Abraham Lincoln, President of the Uni-  
ted States of America, have caused the  
said additional articles to be made pub-  
lic, to the end that the same and every  
clause and article thereof may be ob-  
served and fulfilled with good faith by  
the United States and the citizens there-  
of.  
In witness whereof I have hereunto  
set my hand and caused the seal of the  
United States to be affixed.  
Done in the city of Washington this  
[L. s.] twentieth day of September, in  
the year of our Lord one thousand  
eight hundred and sixty-one, and of  
the Independence of the United States  
the eighty-sixth.

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED  
STATES OF AMERICA.  
A PROCLAMATION.  
WHEREAS an additional article to the  
treaty for the suppression of the African  
slave trade, between the United States  
of America and her Britannic Majesty,  
of the 7th of April, 1862, was concluded  
and signed at Washington by their re-  
spective plenipotentiaries, on the 17th  
day of February, 1863, which additional  
article is, word for word, as follows:—

**Additional Article to the Treaty between  
the United States of America and her  
Britannic Majesty for the suppression  
of the African Slave Trade, signed at  
Washington April 7, 1862.**  
WHEREAS, by the first article of the  
treaty between the United States of  
America and her Majesty the Queen of  
the United Kingdom of Great Britain  
and Ireland, for the suppression of the  
African slave trade, signed at Washing-  
ton on the 7th of April, 1862, it was  
stipulated and agreed that those ships  
of the respective navies of the two high  
contracting parties which shall be pro-  
vided with special instructions for that  
purpose as thereafter mentioned, may  
visit such merchant vessels of the two  
nations as may, upon reasonable grounds,  
be suspected of being engaged in the  
African slave trade, or of having been  
fitted out for that purpose, or of having,  
during the voyage on which they are  
met by the said cruisers, been engaged  
in the African slave trade contrary to  
the provisions of the said treaty; and  
that such cruisers may detain and send  
or carry away such vessels in order that  
they may be brought to trial in the man-  
ner thereafter agreed upon; and where-  
as it was by the said article further  
stipulated and agreed that the recip-  
rocal right of search and detention should  
be exercised only within the distance of  
two hundred miles from the coast of  
Africa, and to the southward of the  
thirty-second parallel of north latitude,  
and within thirty leagues from the coast  
of the island of Cuba; and whereas the  
two high contracting parties are desirous  
of rendering the said treaty still more  
efficacious for its purpose, the plenipo-  
tentiaries who signed the said treaty  
have, in virtue of their full powers, a-  
greed that the reciprocal right of visit  
and detention, as defined in the article  
aforesaid, may be exercised also within  
thirty leagues of the island of Madagas-  
car, within thirty leagues of the island  
of Puerto Rico, and within thirty leagues  
of the island of San Domingo.  
The present additional article shall  
have the same force and validity as if it  
had been inserted word for word in the  
treaty concluded between the two high  
contracting parties on the 7th of April,  
1862, and shall have the same duration  
as that treaty. It shall be ratified, and  
the ratifications shall be exchanged at  
London in six months from this date, or  
sooner if possible.  
In witness whereof the respective  
plenipotentiaries have signed the same,  
and have thereto affixed the seal of  
their arms.  
Done at Washington, the 17th day of  
February, in the year of our Lord one  
thousand eight hundred and sixty-three.

And whereas the said additional article  
has been duly ratified on both parts, and  
the respective ratifications of the same  
were exchanged at London on the 1st  
instant, by Charles Francis Adams, Esq.,  
Envoy Extraordinary and Minister  
Plenipotentiary of the United States, at  
the Court of St. James, and Earl Rus-  
sell, her Britannic Majesty's principal  
Secretary of State for foreign affairs, on  
the part of their respective govern-  
ments:  
Now, therefore, be it known, that I,  
ABRAHAM LINCOLN, President of the  
United States of America, have caused  
the said additional article to be made  
public, to the end that the same,  
and every clause and part thereof, may  
be observed and fulfilled with good faith  
by the United States and the citizens  
thereof.  
In witness whereof, I have hereunto  
set my hand, and caused the seal of the  
United States to be affixed.  
Done at the City of Washington this  
[L. s.] twenty-second day of April, in  
the year of our Lord one thousand  
eight hundred and sixty-three,  
and of the Independence of the  
United States the eighty-seventh.
