If we thought, for a moment, that any appeal we could make would reach his ears and heart, in behalf of an unprincipled and suffering people, how urgently would we beg him to desist from a course so suicidal to his own Southern people and his own native State.

In so disastrous a contingency, the program of degradation and ruin to the South has been proclaimed, with fanatical emphasis and precision, by Mr. Thaddeus Stevens, in his speech at Bedford.

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The Prospect Ahead. Will the Radicals triumph in the approaching Fall elections in the North? This is a question in which the South is profoundly interested.

Oppressively taxed but unrepresented, loyal and true to the government but proscribed and persecuted, tendering the right hand of reconciliation but spurned and insulted, our people await the issue of the coming elections with an anxiety proportionate to the tremendous and vital interests involved.

It is to determine the national destiny of ten States and the individual destinies of eight millions of people. It is to decide whether our Republican form of government is to be preserved in its integrity, or whether it is to be converted into an engine of further oppression, a mere despotism of numbers and possibly a wild and turbulent anarchy.
