Annals to Insurgents.

The Atlantic telegraph informs us that the Turkish authorities have granted a general amnesty to the Cretan insurgents. We imagine that there is not a generous heart in all the earth that will not bear this announcement with delight and pleasure. The human heart, where it is not distorted by passions, delights in mercy. Even General Butler and Mr. Thaddeus Stevens will bear this news with gratification.

But it is curious that while everybody seems so readily to pardon other people's rebels, all are not so willing to pardon their own rebels. The English appeal to the United States in reference to the Southern insurgents, and Mr. Seward makes his appeal for mercy in behalf of the Fenians.

What every one is so anxious to see done, where they are not personally prejudiced on the subject, must be founded in wisdom. Indeed, if history proves anything with its more philosophy teaching by example, it is that reconciliation is a great power in curing political discontent. It has required a long time of stupid misrule, with infinite evils for England to commence to learn this lesson in reference to Ireland. In the same vindictive spirit which General Butler, and men of his class, manifest towards the South, England has governed Ireland, or rather misgoverned her, for long years. It was a long time before public sentiment in England became sufficiently rational and magnanimous to do anything looking to justice to Ireland. During all this time there was a London on England. It was only when a more enlightened and generous policy was pursued by England that the Irish people began to feel the English policy to Ireland.

These men, either from a narrow range of mind, which does not permit them to grasp the great matters involved in the pacification of the South, or because they seek popularity by pandering to the momentary interests of man, think all statesmanship consists in denouncing rebels and systematically trampling upon the South.

For our part, we wish to abolish Southern sectionalism by nationalizing it. We wish to plant the foundations of the Government South in the affections of the people, and have one united, universal, grand country.

We hope that in the spirit of true peace a general amnesty may be proclaimed to all persons involved in our rebellion. We have always prided ourselves on that character of Christianity, which inculcates universal love; and yet the Turkish Government, with a higher source of inspiration to draw its morals from than the Koran, in the very life of the blood, while the insurrection is on hand, proclaims universal forgiveness, and we refuse to exercise this noble prerogative of forgiveness to our erring brothers of the South, though it will be soon two years since the last gun was fired in our melancholy war.—National Intelligencer.

Frightful Railroad Accident. ENTS, PAINE, November 15.—One of the most terrible railroad accidents which has ever occurred in this section of the country, took place on the Buffalo and Erie railroad this afternoon, at about 4 o'clock.

A gang of workmen had been employed in repairing the track about a mile east of Westville, and had removed two rails in so doing. Although fully aware that the New York express train was due, they took no precaution to re-lay the rails, which came at the speed of 30 miles per hour on the down grade. When within a few rods one of the workmen ran back and swung his hat, but was utterly unperceived by the engineer or it was too late. The next moment the engine struck the track, and the engineer, who took in the situation at the same instant, reversed the locomotive.

The train was instantly thrown from the track, and the engine, a distance of some 10 or 15 feet, breaking some of the iron splinters, and piling them with the passengers into a confused heap. For a time the excitement was so great that very little help was rendered. The cries of the wounded and the certainty that some had been killed outright seemed to momentarily dumbfound the faculties of those who had escaped without injury.

After a short time of indecision, the passengers who were able, together with the workmen, applied themselves to the work of removing the debris and attending those who were buried beneath it.

Four dead bodies were taken from the wreck,—three men and a child. The child's mother was also taken out so severely injured that there is no probability of her surviving. Some forty or fifty, perhaps more, were wounded, most of them slightly.

THE PRESIDENT'S SILENCE.—Dr. John W. Ledwith, of Tennessee, who represents the Memphis District in Congress, and who is now at Washington, has addressed a letter to his constituents, in which he says that, in spite of the recent Radical success at the North, and the dark complexion of the next Congress, the President is still as firm in the belief of the final success of his policy of restoration, as he is that it is the only Constitutional and available method, by which the States can be restored to their former unity and prosperity.

The back number, from Bremen, with 170 German emigrants, has arrived. They intend settling in South Carolina, being mostly connected with families already residing there.

One of the editors of the Louisville Courier has been in Brazil, got married, but he looks home again. He says the "South, poor, ruined, and desolate as she is, is worth a hundred Brazils yet."

During his departure, Mr. Seward, Gov. Randall, Mr. Cullum, and Mr. Beveling arrived, and remained in consultation with the President until midnight. It is believed that this meeting was for consultation upon a most important subject, and upon an effort, now making to induce the alterations of a general amnesty, to give the people of the South to accept of a general amnesty, with a qualification of property or intelligence. From this meeting, it is believed, an agreement was reached between the Republicans and Democrats in this effort."
