FROM WASHINGTON. (Special Correspondence of the Richmond Sentinel.) WASHINGTON, Nov. 28, 1900. He has assured many anxious enquirers that his sentiments and purposes have undergone no change, nor will his annual message indicate any compromise of his principles on the ground of expediency, or any other.

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The Fenians. New York, Nov. 29. Intelligence from Toronto says that the Fenian Council has decided to hold a convention in this city. The Fenians are reported to be organizing a raid from Vermont during the trial of Michael Duggan in New York. General Mitchell will be present in person, and will be in command of the Fenian forces.

Washington Matters. WASHINGTON, Nov. 29. The Radical caucus is expected to be held to-night. It has been postponed until next week. A warm opposition was made by some prominent Republican members to its being held, until there was a fuller attendance. To hold it now, they contended, would enable the few members in the city to block out the work of the session, to suit their own peculiar views, as was done at the opening of the last session.

Washington Matters. WASHINGTON, Nov. 29. Many Southern members still are striving and securing quarters for the winter. Marquis Monthebon, the French Minister, has informed his government that he is leaving for Mexico to inspect the remains of the troops from Mexico; they sailed in the steamer "Cuba." Monthebon doubts that the French troops will leave Mexico by the middle of January, and express surprise at the American press, insisting that there is complication on national questions with France. He visited the State Department this morning and there met the Mexican Minister, whom he greeted cordially. Monthebon leaves for France on the 30th of December. His successor will arrive on the 16th of December.

Washington Matters. WASHINGTON, Nov. 29. The United States steamer "Florida" Island, with Admiral Palmaer, has sailed from Norfolk on a cruise to inspect the vessels of his squadron stationed in Southern waters. The Gulf squadron will shortly be consolidated with the North Atlantic squadron, making it one of the largest in the service.
