THESE things, such as paper weights, card cases, combs, erasers, leathers, dusters, chalks, pens, ink, and many other articles, which might be listed, are scattered throughout the book in quantities sufficient to supply all friends.

THE FOLLOWING are the instructions, in the form of a circular, to District Attorneys and Marshals, etc., which have been issued by the Attorney General's office, in accordance with the recent Executive order addressed to heads of departments:

Circular to all District Attorneys and Marshals of the United States, and to all their respective Assistants and Deputies, and to all persons holding any official relation to the Attorney General's Office.

SIR: I herewith furnish you with an official copy of the proclamation of the President of the United States, dated the 31st inst., and in the ninety-second year of American Independence:

This proclamation revives in full the obligations of loyalty to the Republic, and was intended to admonish you, in common with all persons holding any place of honor, trust or profit, civil or military, at home or abroad, under the United States of America, and all good citizens thereof, that the constitution of their country is in danger, and that the Government thereof, with its several co-ordinate branches, legislative, executive and judicial, is the only lawful Government for this Republic, notwithstanding that many well-meaning citizens have, in consequence of disturbing events that are now happily past, come to look with indulgence upon the late and desperate pretences of the Constitution is not the supreme law of the land, and also the most authentic proof of the will of the people; but that there are powers in the government of the Constitution which may lawfully violate that instrument, if the laws made in pursuance of it.

All citizens of the United States owe allegiance to that authority, as the same is embodied and organized in the Constitution and such amendments thereof as have become expedient in the progress of the country, and have been duly made and enacted. In a special manner, all persons holding office under the United States are solemnly sworn to support the Constitution and allegiance to the United States.

It is known that they have been appointed, or have been placed, by their respective offices, upon express assurances and obligations to the United States, which obligations have been solemnly renewed to them by the laws of the United States, and that they have taken an oath to support the Constitution and allegiance to the United States.
