APPEALS.—By some means, the impression has gained general currency that the decision of the Military Commission recently convened in this City, for the trial of Tolson and Messrs Powers and Watkins, in the alleged murder and conspiracy to kidnap negro Fisher, who committed the same upon the person of Miss Massie, in Fayetteville, in February last, has been adverse to the prisoners, and that they have been sentenced to be hung. QUEEN BY COL. BONFORD. The following timely order has been issued by our Post Commandant. Though only operative, as the order of Col. Bonford, within his special jurisdiction, it makes reference to a Department Order, which is applicable to the entire State. We say that the Order is timely. We have heard of no organization of white persons, bearing arms or intending to be armed, in the State, but we know of several organizations of colored persons, who have paraded and drilled, and disturbed neighborhoods with noisy and even violent demonstrations. An instance has recently occurred in this county, under the auspices of it, is supposed, of the Union League, and it is this, which has doubtless caused the order from Col. Bonford. We do not feel at liberty to refer to the matter, for the present, in view of the steps that are being taken to ferret out the actors in these disturbances and prevent their recurrence.
