THE CONVENTION.

The Suffrage question occupied the attention of the "so-called" during the evening session of Tuesday. Mr. Graham, of Orange, made a strong argument in favor of the majority report, submitted by himself and Mr. Durham, and in opposition to Mr. McDonald's report.

Mr. McDonald, of Chatham, and Mr. King, of Lenoir, while advocating negro suffrage, opposed the disfranchisement of any white man. This is better than we expected from that quarter, and it always affords us pleasure to give even the "old boy" his due.

Mr. Laffin, (Yankee Radical), went "the whole hog" in his judgment from the tenor of our report. This is just about as we expected, and, therefore, it would be a waste of ammunition to shoot at Laffin.

Yesterday, the suffrage question was resumed. The discussion was opened by Mr. Watts, of Martin, whose principal artillery, (or, perhaps, we should say small arms), was directed against the institution of slavery, as such, as wicked, vile and abominable.
