low policy of war and proscription which
has been inaugurated in North Carolina.]

that we are very reluctantly compelled to
forgo the publication of these proceedings
entire, and we trust that our friends will
appreciate the **necessity** which forces us to
curtail them. We give abstracts of each
meeting.]

ORANGE.

At the Democratic and Conservative
meeting in this grand old county, on the
28th ult., Nelson P. Hall, Esq., presided, and
Capt. Robert D. Graham, and Joseph
C. Webb, Jr., acted as Secretaries.

Col. Ed. H. Hall, of New Hanover, the
late Conservative candidate for Lieutenant
Governor, being present, was introduced to
the meeting by Henry K. Nash, Esq., when
he addressed it in a speech of great elo-
quence and ability.

Maj. J. W. Graham, on behalf of a Com-
mittee for that purpose, presented a series of
admirable resolutions, which were unani-
mously adopted. Among them were the
following:

Resolved., That the spirit of expansion ex-
hibited by the majority of the present Leg-
islature, and their subserviency to Executive
dictation, meet our unqualified condemnation,
and we solemnly protest against the
exercise of powers not delegated by the
Constitution, and will use all lawful means
to prevent encroachments upon our rights.

Resolved., That the faithful administra-
tion of Gov. Jonathan Worth, under the ad-
verse circumstances by which he was sur-
rounded, his zeal for the honor of North
Carolina and untiring efforts to promote
the best interests of her citizens, as well as
his manly and dignified protest on leaving
the Executive office, deserve our warmest
thanks.

RANDOLPH.

We alluded briefly, on yesterday, to the
immaculate and enthusiastic meeting in this
County, at Asheboro, and mentioned its
officers.

We learn that the Radical County Com-
missioners refused the meeting and Gov.
Worth the use of the Court House, except
for a very limited time, and the crowd
adjourned to the Presbyterian Church, which
was tendered for the occasion. The audience
was so large that the building could not
contain half the people, and Gov. Worth
addressed them from one of the windows.

An Executive Committee of three gentle-
men from each district in the county was
appointed.

enthusiastic meeting in this county, at
Hertford, on the 1st inst.

Ratification resolutions were adopted, a
Seymour and Blair Club organized, and
delegates appointed to the State Conven-
tion.

cause of Constitutional liberty.

For the Sentinel, ORGANIZATION OF A SEYMORE &
BLAIR CLUB FOR PANTHER BRANCH DISTRICT, WAKE COUNTY,
N. C.

Pursuant to previous notice, the Conven-
tions of Panther Branch District met at
Mrs. Banks', on Saturday, Aug. 1st, 1868,
for the purpose of organizing a Seymour
and Blair Club.

There being a full turn out of people as-
sembled, the meeting was called to order
by Dr. A. E. Smith, who addressed the
Club with his usual ability and explained
the object of the meeting.

On motion, J. J. L. McCullers was re-
quested to take the Chair, and H. B. Jordan
and W. H. Rand to act as temporary Secre-
taries.

On motion of C. E. McCullers, a Commit-
tee of five were appointed to draft a Consti-
tution and by-laws for the Club, and the
following gentlemen were appointed for that
purpose: Dr. A. E. Smith, B. H. Jewell,
M. McT. Stephenson, W. A. Myatt and
Simon Smith.

On motion of L. Banks, Esq., a Commit-
tee of five were appointed to select permanent
officers for the Club, and the following
were appointed as a Committee, viz: W.
D. Crowder, S. S. Turner, J. W. Jones,
Lyman Banks and A. T. Stevens.

The Committee on permanent officers re-
ported as follows: For President, J. J. L.
McCullers; Vice Presidents, J. J. Young,
Jonathan Smith, Dr. J. H. Jones; Recording
Secretary, W. H. Rand; Corresponding
Secretary, Henry B. Jordan; Treasurer,
Henry Stevens; Directors, James T. Leach,
Dr. A. E. Smith, C. E. McCullers, B. F.
Walton and H. B. Jordan.

Which appointments, on motion, were
unanimously adopted by the Club.

The Committee on Constitution and Reso-
lutions reported that for Seymour and
Blair Clubs published in the *Sentinel*, and submitted
the following resolutions:

Resolved., That we declare our unaltering
devotion to the great principles of civil
liberty contained in the Constitution of the
United States, and our eternal hostility to
the many usurpations of Congress, by which it
that Constitution has been disregarded and
trampled under foot.

Resolved., That we fully endorse the plat-
form of principles recently adopted by the
great National Democratic Convention as
assembled in the City of New York, and that
we pledge ourselves to the nominees of that Convention,
Horatio Seymour, of New York, and
Franklin P. Blair, of Missouri, but united
and undivided support.

Resolved., That we will use every lawful
effort in our power to re-establish a truly
republican State government, in the place
of the one now forced upon us by Congress,
which, on motion, were unanimously adopted.

On motion, those desiring to become
members of the Club proceeded to sign the
constitution, and seventy signatures were
collected.

Information being given that there were
some colored Conservatives present, who
desired to become members, on motion they
were allowed to sign the Constitution.

Upon motion, the Club adjourned, with
three cheers for Seymour and Blair,
J. J. L. McCULLERS, President.
