ELECTORAL MEETING OF THE FIRST CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT. At a meeting of the delegates of the First Congressional District, held in the evening of the 13th inst., on motion, Major Henry A. Gilliam, of Chowan, was called to the Chair, and Jordan Stone, of Halifax, appointed Secretary.

On a call of the Counties comprising the District, eleven were found to be represented. Upon motion, it was decided to go into the nomination of an Elector, for said District, and on further motion, it was decided that the nomination should be made upon the basis of representation in the House of Representatives.

An election being proceeded with, resulted in the selection of Thos. J. Jarvis, of Currituck, as Elector for the District. Mr. Jarvis accepted the nomination with a few appropriate remarks, expressing his determination to use his best exertions to prove himself worthy of the position which had been accorded him.

On motion, the following named gentlemen were recommended as Sub-Electors for the different counties composing the District: NORTHAMPTON—Jas Odum, Capt. R. B. Peobles, Thos W. Mason, Henry C. Edwards, Edmund Jacobs, Capt Emory Martin and Capt Geo Barnes.

On motion, the meeting adjourned. A motion of thanks was returned to the Elector of the meeting, and on further motion, the Raleigh Standard and W. Wilson were requested to publish the proceedings thereof. On motion, the meeting adjourned.
