State.—Having heard that an attempt was made on your life, last night, I have set two detectives at work upon the case and would like an interview at your earliest convenience to obtain any information that may aid in pursuit of the offender.

I have called twice at your office this morning but failed to see you.

I am authorized to say if you will state on honor that you believe an attempt has been made to assassinate you, a reward of five hundred dollars will be at once offered for the arrest of the criminal.

Sir.—I have received your communication of the date of yesterday, in which you say you called twice at my office but failed to see me. I never heard of the call until you are informed in your note. My Book-keeper, Mr. Ramsey, informed me that Mr. Brier had called to get the particulars of the attempt to assassinate me, when I directed him to say I would not talk with Mr. Brier. I gave no reason at the time, but my reason was, that Brier had accompanied the Speaker of the House, Joseph Holden, with his mob, all armed, and, as I think, to take my life at the depot. Mr. Ramsey says he saw you in the street near our office, but you did not speak, nor did Brier speak to him of your presence. You say "you have two detectives at work upon the case," and you are authorized to say that if I will state upon honor, that an attempt has been made to assassinate me, the Governor will offer a reward of \$500 for the arrest of the criminal.

As to detectives, they are not officers of the law, nor do I recognize your right or duty to call out your militia or detectives unless called upon by the civil authority, when that power shall be unable to execute the law?

I deem it proper to add, that last night was not the first time that criminal violence had been attempted upon my person. As to the last attempt, I can only State what you have seen in the *Sentinel*. Since that public statement giving the particulars of being fired upon through my window, I have heard Mr. J. W. Watson who lives near our office say, he heard the report of the gun, and soon thereafter heard a man running rapidly by his house, and he remarked at the time some one had been shot. This is all that I can state except the fact that Gen. Estes, member of the Legislature from New Hanover, before the last attempt at assassination, was heard to say in the presence of some three or four persons, that if any person would shoot Joe Turner— even in the back he could be pardoned immediately, or it might be, have his pardon in his pocket when he committed the act.

The first attempt upon my life was on the 20th of March last. Joseph Holden son of the Governor and Speaker of the House of Commons having threatened to shoot us on sight, engaged a number of armed men in the morning to meet him at 5 o'clock in the evening upon the arrival of the train, upon which he had been informed I was to come. According to this preconcerted arrangement the Speaker of the House, with C. L. Harris Superintendent of Public Works, C. M. Farris Keeper of the Capitol, Jenkins Chief Clerk and son of the Treasurer, B. F. Menninger, Clerk and brother of the Secretary of State, F. A. Beeler, whom I have before mentioned, Lieutenant Pike, and others, were at the depot, armed with clubs and deadly weapons, to attack me. By this drawing a pistol and giving notice to all present, I would give up them, they halted until the police came up and arrested them.

The Governor, himself, stated, in a public speech, that he was cognizant of what his son, the Speaker of the House, had said and done, and he approved it all.

I should, therefore, have some hesitation in accepting his offer of redress through the military, even if that were the proper channel through which to punish offenders against the criminal law, in a State with a constitutional government.

As you are a stranger, with little or no acquaintance with our laws or people, allow me to suggest that you have an interview with Judge Ware instead of with me; his Court and Grand Jury are now in session, and I have no doubt his Honor will tell you that I should rely upon him and the Grand Jury and peace officers of the State and not upon you and the military. He will tell you that you go beyond the spheres of your duty in calling out detectives and militia. His Honor will also tell you that you are in error to require me to "state an honor that an attempt had been made upon my life," and that you should require of me to swear it upon the Holy Evangelist or Almighty God.

## EDITORIAL NOTES AND ODEAN INGS.

"BEGONE AND LEAVE ME, I'LL HEAR NO MORE."

In the *Standard* of yesterday, is an editorial written by the editor himself, writing once, death, plague and confusion, upon the coward who attempted to assassinate him. He says he believes no language sufficiently strong, to express his abomination of the man who committed this act. Yet the Governor, before it entered his mind, advertised on the 3d of June, 1861, asking who would plot for old Andy, need I say, not your gory locks at Booth, than can't not say he did all that we are not disposed to controvert. The point with which we start is altogether different. We rep it at. Was the right of a State to secede settled? We agree with the *Statesman* in the opinion that that question was not disengaged, as it was submitted to the great test. "What was brought to that test was the question whether the Southern States had the power to effect their separation by arms;" and that and no other was the point decided. Great principles are obscured or obscured under the heavy clouds of political mud, will surround the correctness of a principle when it is not involved in the contest at all. We are not contending whether secession was right or wrong. That issue will probably never be before the American people again. But we insist that its "heresy or orthodoxy" was not under consideration during the war. It was altogether a question of power.

3 The New York *Galaxy*, one of the best of American monthlies, makes this wise remark: "The stability and durability of the National government must still depend upon the retention of, and adherence to, the original design and symmetry of our system. The preservation of the State governments, without their original and rightful powers, is essential to a maintenance of the National government." This is a political truth of the first importance, and any serious departure from it will entail upon us the most direful results.

4 The *Galaxy* contains some remarks on the 2d of the last, in connection with the stage which are worthy of note. It is known to all what a *furore* there is in the modish displays up on the stage, *Black Crooks* and *White Fawns* and *Our Cans* will attract, when the legitimate drama will not. The *Galaxy* protests against the style of *leg on exhibition* nightly, in certain theatres, and, in the interest of true art, observes:

"We have now before us the photographic half a dozen of the most famous stage-dancers of the hour, the display of whose form is said to have induced the widest admiration of untold multitudes of gossips, and we have also before us photographs of half a dozen of the models or ideals of the perfect female figures, which the genius of antique Greece left for everlasting study and admiration. The contrast between the symmetry, grace and delicacy of the antique outline of the limb and features, and of the modern spectacular dancer, is as great as it well could be.

If the exhibition of legs is to continue as one of the chief attractions of the modern stage, it would be well to get a supply characterized by symmetry, grace, and delicacy, in place of those that are stuff and swill, to avoid丑 and obnoxious proportions."

### THE NATIONAL DEBT.

The best way of paying off the tremendous National debt has long puzzled financiers, and will tax to the utmost Senator Boutwell's ability. The debt, we believe, amounts to some \$1,400,000,000. It is enormous. The latest plan suggested in the Baltimore *Home Journal*. We have only room for the following, as to the species and surest way of reducing the debt:

"How can this be done? Simply by authorizing the issue of enough 'greenbacks,' (which will increase the currency about five per cent) to redeem and cancel the bonds held by the National Banks, thereby substituting a non-interest bearing debt of \$350,000,000 for a similar amount of debt bearing 5 per cent interest. In this, thus saving their constituents \$20,000,000 interest. In concomitance, and giving them a currency which they prefer. This step would shorten the distance to specie payments very materially, and give the public both here and abroad increased confidence in the Government's determination to pay its debts."

Applying this \$300,000,000, and the interest saved annually, to the reduction of the National Debt bearing interest, and in the included short space of 33 years not one dollar of the \$1,233,187,936 will remain bearing and matured only with interest due."

THE CONNECTICUT ELECTION.
