THE KU KLUX CASE. — The case of the State, Barker, Olive and Collins, was resumed yesterday and at about 8 o'clock at night, was ended by a verdict from the jury of "Not guilty."

The Prosecution was ably conducted by Solicitor Cox and Mrs. Phillips and F. L. Busby, and the defense as ably by Messrs. Fowle and Badger and York. All evidence that was to be obtained was brought out, and all the points of law in the case brought to bear.
