MORE INCENDIARISM.—On Thursday night last, a little after mid-night, Mr. Nelson Hunter, residing eight miles from Raleigh, on the Holly Springs road, was aroused by his wife who had discovered that there was a fire on the premises. On going to the door, he discovered that an empty shuck-pen had been fired, and that the flames were communicating by the fence to some larger buildings, among which were his barn and stable. He rushed out to beat away the burning fence, and called back to his wife to bring the stable key that he might get his horse out, in case he could not stop the fire.

As soon as his wife left the dwelling, he saw a negro run to the door and start to go in; he ran towards him, calling his dog, when the negro turned and fled. The dog came up, but instead of going after the negro, jumped on a smaller dog, and while Mr. Hunter was getting him away, the retreating negro threw a stone, with great force which just missed his head. He saw but one person, but heard at least one other, as they went off. The shock pen and a considerable portion of fence were burned.

We call the Governor's attention to these continual outrages. He seems to be more and more inclined—indeed one of the laws passed under another—although the one reads to the other.

A special meeting of Post Sedgwick No. 2, G. A. H., held at the Sheriff's office, Raleigh, N. C., for the purpose of making arrangements for decorating and otherwise memorializing the graves of the Union dead, at the Union cemetery, on the 30th day of May, 1870.

Sheriff F. E. Lee, in the chair.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That Dr. H. J. McMinister be requested to act as orator on the day set apart, May 30th, for decorating the graves of the Union dead.

Resolved, That John H. Rorer, Esq., be respectfully requested to act as chaplain on the occasion.

Resolved, That Major W. H. Martin be requested to act as president of the procession.

Resolved, That the usual procession be dispensed with.

Resolved, That the Raleigh brass band be engaged for the occasion, and that Major Martin be constituted a committee of one to make necessary arrangements.

Resolved, That the chair designate the committees on Finance and decorations.

The chair appointed W. W. Thompson, Esq., to act as chairman of the Finance Committee, and W. W. Powers, Esq., Major C. B. Whittington, Agent Kilmer, Esq., and W. H. Battle, Esq., to act as chairmen of the decoration Committee.

Resolved, That the following named persons be designated a committee of arrangement: Sheriff T. F. Lee, Col. A. W. Shaffer and Jos. H. W. Holden.

Motion was made and carried that the Raleigh Standard and Sentinel, be requested to publish the proceedings of this meeting.

Moved and seconded that when this meeting adjourn, it adjourn to meet at the sheriff's office on the 26th day of May, at 8 o'clock, P. M.
