SENATE.

Prayer by Rev. Mr. Grayson, of the

Methodist Episcopal Church, second

reading.

On motion of Mr. Jordan, the rules

were suspended and the resolution in

favor of A. U. Cowles, was taken up and

passed.

By Mr. Jordan, a bill to incorporate

a railroad from Gaston to Lenoir

was read.

On motion of Mr. Jordan, the rules

were suspended and the bill to create a

commission to inquire into the condition

of the State, was taken up. (Appointed D. S.

Reid, of Rockingham, O. P. Meares, of

Wilmington and John U. Kirkland, of

Orange as said commission.)

Mr. Jordan said that the delay attend-

ing the action on this bill, had been caused

by the difficulty of obtaining the services

of competent gentlemen.

Mr. Ashe said he had received a tele-

gram from Judge Moore, stating that he

could not attend on the Commission, but

that Mr. Aldridge would therefore be struck

out of the list. Mr. Jordan said that the

motion was adopted.

Mr. Phillips thought that the bill should

mention names; the selection of gentlemen

should be considered after the propo-

sition had been agreed to. He moved to strike

out the other two names.

Mr. Hargrove thought that the Speaker

should appoint. The Commission was in

the nature of a Committee and its mem-

bers should be members of the Legislature.

Mr. Jordan said that the report that Gov.

Reid had accepted the appointment was a

mistake. Gov. Reid had written to

the subject, and now had the matter

under consideration. Mr. S. was opposed

to the Commission being composed of

members of the Legislature. He remem-

bered how fruitless had been the labors of

the last legislative Commission in the ex-

amination into these frauds and corrup-

tions. He moved to amend the bill so

that the members should be appointed

by the Governor.

Mr. Jordan nominated David S. Reid,

of Rockingham, as a member of the Com-

mission.

Mr. Martin thought the Commission

should be composed of members of the

General Assembly. He made a motion to
