CERTAINTY OF CONFIDENCE

Electoral frauds are very uncertain, yet we are seldom mistaken in our calculations as to their result. When many of our friends were sanguine and confident of beating Holden in 1868, we did not hesitate to say his majority would be twenty thousand. In the election of last year, when our friends doubted and despaired of our success, we did not hesitate to say we would carry the senate and house by overwhelming majorities.

The overwhelming defeat of the radicals last August, while it astonished our friends, it utterly dumfounded the radical organ. But for that victory, Littlefield, Andrew Jones, Dr. Sloan, Laifon, Estes and Holden would be here in full force and pliancy to-day.

Five thousand negroes have left the state since August last. They continue to leave up to this present writing. About the middle of June, we saw thirty nine on the train in South Carolina, from Edge plantations of Louisiana. The period having them in charge, only three weeks before we saw him, earned fifty from the same county. His calculation was, that five thousand had been carried out of the state since August last. They were known to be for it in 1851, and never changed that opinion until 1871.

He demonstrated conclusively that it was not only the constitutional but the usual and safe mode in North Carolina of changing the organic law of the state.
